

Tender of Them is Made to Guatemala and San Salvador.

SITUATION IS COMPLICATED.

Honduras Has Been Drawn in-Nicaragua Will Remain Neutral-Bonilla Wants Guarantees.

Washington, July 15 .- Both Guatemala and San Salvador have accepted the tender of the good offices of this government, looking to a settlement of their difficulties. This information is conveyed in official disputches received in the state department today from the American diplomatic representatives in Guatemala and Salvador announcing that the two belligerent countries have availed themselves of the tender of the good offices of the United States looking to their approaching each other in a conference having in view an adjustment of their differences the cessation of hostilities and the bringing about of peace.

The advices to the state department, it is stated, make no reference to the question of declaration of war, re-garding which President Bouilla of Honduras today announced that Honduras had made no declaration of war and that "Guatemala invaded territory out previous declaration.

While both Guatemana and Salvador have accepted in principle the proposi tion for a peace conference, the question of arbitration would be a subject of future consideration. A fortnight ago there was a disposition on the part of the belligerents to arbitrate, question then was whether Guatemala had injured Salvador by harboring in-surgents on her territory or whether Salvador, by doing the same thing, had injured Guatemala.

But the recent battle with the death of Gen. Regalado, the former presider of Salvador and the leader of the Salvadorean troops, changed the situation It is pointed out that as no territorial or boundary question is in dispute the matter of indemnity for invasion of territory would be a main question by the peace conference. So far no ad. vices have reached this government regarding the battle which took place Saturday night and in which, as stated Salvador advices tonight, the Salvadorean army defeated the Guatemalan forces at Platanar. The advices regarding the Central American situation are forwarded to the president at Oys. ter Bay by Acting Secy, of State Bacon, who is in charge of the state de-partment affairs during the absence of Secy, Root. Mr. Bacon made arrangements to leave Washington for Oyster Bay on the midnight train tonight. It is understood that he is carrying dispatches and other papers bearing on the situation to lay before the president tomorrow. All that Mr. Eacon would say regarding the situation was that everything was progressing favorably.

The navy department had no advices from Central America today in regard to the troubles there.

## TERMS OF THE ULTIMATUM.

### Are Rejected and Rather a They Haughty Question is Propounded.

Washington, July 15 .- In view of the determination of the state department to renew its demands upon the Venezuelan government for the settlement American claims against Venezuela, it is a matter of interest to note the precise status of those troublesome is. sues when negotiations were suspended

in March, 1905. For the first time the red book discloses in terms the ultimatum laid down by the late secretary of state, John Hay, in an instruction to Mr. Bowen, dated Murch 10 of that year:


"The attitude of the Venezuelan gov-rament toward the government of the United States and toward the interests of its citizens, who have suffered so grave and frequent wrongs arbitrarily committed by the government of Ven-ezuela require that justice should now be fully done, once for all. If the gov-ernment of Venezuela declines to consent to an impartial arbitration insur-ing the rendition of complete justice to these injured parties, the govern-ment of the United States may be regretfully compelled to take such meas-ures as it may find necessary to effect complete redress without resort to aritration. The government of the inited States stands committed to the hitration. principle of impartial arbitration which can do injustice to nobody and if its moderate request is peremptorily refused it will be at liberty to consider f it is compelled to resort to more in this compensed to resort to more vigorous measures whether these measures shall include complete in-demnification, not only for the citi-zens aggrieved, but for any expenses of the government of the United States which may attend their execution."

The Venezuelah government's an-swer, rendered March 23, amounted to a rejection of the ultimatum for it de-nied that Venezuela had any questions pending with the United States, and propounded the following interroga-tion:

Before giving further consideration to Mr. Hay's note the Venezuelan gov-crnment states that it must know whether the United States respects the methods and nobility of the Venezuelans.

Panama, July 15 .- The fact that Horduras has been drawn into the Central American conflict complicates the situ-ation there. The Associated Press is informed that President Bonilia of Honduras may be compelled by President Zelaya of Nicaragua and Presi-dent Escalon of Salvador, both of whom are said to be enemies of President Es-trada Cabrera of Guatemala, to take sides with them.

Dr. Fernando Sanchez, former minis-ter of foreign affairs in the cabinet of President Zelaya, who is now here, says he believes Honduras was provoked by President Cabrera who, it is reported. furnished arms and financial ald to for President Juan Angel Arias and Gen. Rivas to start a revolution in Honduras and Salvador, where they en-

Honduras and salvador, where they en-joy great prestige. Dr. Sanchez adds that unless the re-ported death of Gen. Lomaz Regalado, commander of the Salvadorean army, be true, Guatemala, in his opinion, stands no chance of defeating the coalition.

### WANTS GUARANTEES.

Panama, July 15 .- United States Min-Isters Combs at Guatemala City and Merry at San Salvador have approach-ed, respectively, Presidents Cabrera and Escalon in an endeavor to reestablish peace between Guatemala and Salvador. President Cabrera informed Mr. Coombs that he is willing to enter into pegotiations for peace provided the United States government will guarantee that further hostilities against Guatemala will cease.

NICARAGUA NEUTRAL.

Managua, Nicaragua, July 15 .- In reply to a request for a statement as to the truth or falsity of the reports that Nicaragua has assisted in the war against Guatemala, the Associated Press today received the following statement from President Zelaya; "Nicaragua has been, is, and will re-main neutral."

# ON MURDERER'S TRAIL.

Two Posses in Pursuit of John Me-Pherson of Knoxville, Tenn.

Knoxville, Tenn., July 15 -- John Me-Pherson is a fugitive from justice, charged with the murder of Grant Smith, a former merchant of this city, and the fatal wounding of Deputy Sheriff William Walker, who attempted to arrest him. Mc-Pherson was accompanied by his fath-er, Dr. Buck McPherson, and the two fied in a buggy toward the mountains. Deputy Sheriff Walker pursued them and demanded the surrender of young McPherson, who shot him through the lung. Walker will die.
