

UNITED STATES' OFFICES ACCEPTED

Tender of Them is Made to Guatemala and San Salvador.

SITUATION IS COMPLICATED.

Honduras Has Been Drawn In—Nicaragua Will Remain Neutral—Boniilla Wants Guarantees.

Washington, July 13.—Both Guatemala and San Salvador have accepted the tender of the good offices of this government, looking to a settlement of their difficulties. This information is conveyed in official dispatches received in the state department today from the American diplomatic representatives in Guatemala and Salvador announcing that the two belligerent countries have availed themselves of the tender of the good offices of the United States looking to the approaching of a peace conference having in view an adjustment of their differences the cessation of hostilities and the bringing about of peace.

The advice to the state department, it is stated, make no reference to the pending declaration of war, regarding which President Bonilla of Honduras today announced that Honduras had no declaration of war and that "Guatemala invaded territory without previous declaration."

While both Guatemala and Salvador have accepted in principle the proposition for a peace conference, the question of arbitration would be a subject of future consideration. A fortnight ago there was a disposition on the part of the belligerents to arbitrate. The question then was whether Guatemala had injured Salvador by harboring insurgents on her territory or whether Salvador, by doing the same thing, had injured Guatemala.

But the recent battle with the death of Gen. Regalado, the former president of Salvador and the leader of the Salvadoran troops, changed the situation. It is pointed out that as no territorial or boundary question is in dispute the matter of indemnity for invasion of territory would be a main question by the peace conference. So far no advice has reached this government regarding the battle which took place Saturday night and in which, as stated in Salvador advice tonight, the Salvadoran army defeated the Guatemalan forces at Patzún. The advice regarding the Central American situation are forwarded to the president at Oyster Bay by Acting Secy. of State Bacon, who is in charge of the state department affairs during the absence of Secy. Root. Mr. Bacon made arrangements to leave Washington for Oyster Bay on the midnight train tonight. It is understood that he is carrying dispatches and other papers bearing on the situation to lay before the president tomorrow. All that Mr. Bacon would say regarding the situation was that everything was progressing favorably.

The navy department had no advice from Central America today in regard to the troubles there.

HONDURAS DRAWN IN.
Panama, July 13.—The fact that Honduras has been drawn into the Central American conflict complicates the situation there. The Associated Press has informed that President Bonilla of Honduras may be compelled by President Zelaya of Nicaragua and President Escalon of Salvador, both of whom are said to be enemies of President Estrada Cabrera of Guatemala, to take sides with them.

WANTS GUARANTEES.
Panama, July 13.—United States Ministers Combs at Guatemala City and Merry at San Salvador have approached, respectively, Presidents Cabrera and Escalon in an endeavor to reestablish peace between Guatemala and Salvador. President Cabrera informed Mr. Combs that he is willing to enter into negotiations for peace provided the United States government will guarantee that further hostilities against Guatemala will cease.

NICARAGUA NEUTRAL.
Managua, Nicaragua, July 13.—In reply to a request for a statement as to the truth or falsity of the reports that Nicaragua has assisted in the war against Guatemala, the Associated Press today received the following statement from President Zelaya: "Nicaragua has been, is, and will remain neutral."

ROOSEVELT MAY SUCCEED.
New York, July 13.—The Associated Press has received the following from Locadito Gramajo, private secretary to Manuel Cabrera, president of Guatemala: "It is possible that the efforts of President Roosevelt to secure a peaceful settlement of the difficulty between Guatemala and Salvador may result successfully at any moment."

BONILLA BLAMES GUATEMALA.
New York, July 13.—The following dispatch has been received by the Associated Press from President Bonilla of Honduras: "Honduras has not declared war. Guatemala invaded territory without previous declaration. BONILLA."

SAN FRANCISCO RAPIDLY REBUILDING.

San Francisco, July 13.—San Francisco is arising from its ashes with a rapidity that surprises all, and building is progressing on all sides. The labor situation is exciting much inquiry, and the building and construction committee, after careful investigation and conference with employers and employees, through the building trades council, with which all building trades artisans are affiliated, and the Builders' exchange and Builders' association, representing the employers, contractors and material men, has ascertained that in all trades except the building trades the demand is fully supplied, with one exception, ordinary laborers, several thousand of whom are in immediate demand for railway construction and debris removal.

In the building trades conditions are entirely different. Mechanics are needed in all departments of the building industry, particularly in the following trades: Plumbers, electrical workers, gas and electric fixture hangers, hod-carriers, bricklayers, cement workers, bridge and structural ironworkers, architectural ironworkers, plasterers, lathers, carpenters, sheet metalworkers and elevator constructors.

FAMINE IN RUSSIA.

Council of Empire Accepts Bill Appropriating \$7,500,000.

St. Petersburg, July 13.—The council of the empire has accepted, without amendment, parliament's bill appropriating \$7,500,000 for famine relief, which came as a surprise, but has occasioned the greatest jubilation in the lower house, as it is regarded as a vote of lack of confidence in the Goremyn ministry on the part of the upper chamber. While many speakers in the council of the empire really favored the adoption of the bill, their recommendation, they recognized that it would be a fatal mistake for the council to antagonize the lower house in the present crisis.

Moreover, all those on the inside were aware that the negotiations between the government and the Constitutional Democrats were entering the final stage.

According to tonight's report, all the questions of principle involved in a change of ministry have been resolved, and now it is merely a matter of procedure.

The emperor is still objecting to certain names proposed by the Constitutional Democrats. Admiral Skrydloff probably will succeed the late Vice Admiral Chodkinn, commander of the Black Sea fleet.

STORM IN DENVER.

Boy Killed by Lightning and Woman Dies of Heart Failure.

Denver, Colo., July 13.—During a downpour of rain last night Charles P. Hollingshead, junior, aged 16, was killed by lightning, and Miss Eliza Hamon, aged 34, died of heart failure due to overexcitement in running through the storm to her home. Both deaths were reported to the coroner today. Young Hollingshead was returning home when lightning struck a telephone pole near where the boy was walking, and a flooded sidewalk communicated the deadly fluid to his body. His body was not found until this morning.

ARMY RELIEF EXPENDITURES.

Washington, July 14.—Quartermaster Gen. Humphrey, of the army, has compiled a statement, showing that the amount necessary to be expended as a result of the fire in San Francisco under the various titles of appropriations for his department aggregates \$1,265,478.

DEMANDS UPON VENEZUELA

The State Department is Determined to Renew and Enforce Them.

TERMS OF THE ULTIMATUM.

They Are Rejected and Rather a Haughty Question is Propounded.

Washington, July 13.—In view of the determination of the state department to renew its demands upon the Venezuelan government for the settlement of American claims against Venezuela, it is a matter of interest to note the precise status of those troublesome issues when negotiations were suspended in March, 1905.

For the first time the red book discloses in terms the ultimatum laid down by the late secretary of state, John Hay, in an instruction to Mr. Bowen, dated March 10 of that year:

"The attitude of the Venezuelan government toward the government of the United States and toward the interests of its citizens, who have suffered so grave and frequent wrongs arbitrarily committed by the government of Venezuela require that justice should now be fully done, once for all. If the government of Venezuela declines to consent to an impartial arbitration instituting the rendition of complete justice to these injured parties, the government of the United States may be reluctantly compelled to take such measures as it may find necessary to effect complete redress without resort to arbitration. The government of the United States stands committed to the principle of impartial arbitration which can do justice to nobody and if its modest request is peremptorily refused it will be at liberty to consider if it is compelled to resort to more vigorous measures whether these measures shall include complete indemnification, not only for the citizens aggrieved, but for the expenses of the government of the United States which may attend their execution."

The Venezuelan government's answer, rendered March 23, amounted to a rejection of the ultimatum for it denied that Venezuela had any questions pending with the United States, and propounded the following interpellation:

"Before giving further consideration to Mr. Hay's note the Venezuelan government states that it must know whether the United States respects the methods and nobility of the Venezuelans."

Mr. Bowen adds that the answer is unyielding and requires no further ultimatum. Perhaps the explanation for the rather defiant attitude which the Venezuelan government occupies to this day, so far as the official correspondence shows, is to be found in a phrase of a telegram from Minister Bowen to the secretary of state reporting that Senor Jesus Paul, President Castro's private representative, who was then in Washington, actively cultivating public sentiment in this country, advised to the asphalt claims, had cabled directly to President Castro that the United States government would not answer Mr. Bowen or, if it did, would give him conciliatory instructions.

KILLED BY LIGHTNING.

One Person Dead and Four Others Seriously Injured.

Chicago, July 13.—One person was killed and four seriously injured by lightning today while seeking shelter from a rainstorm under a tree at Iowa street and the Lake Shore drive.

DEAD.

INJURED.

Several buildings were struck by lightning and set on fire, the most seriously damaged being the residence of Archbishop James E. Guigay at 423 North State street, which sustained a loss of about \$10,000.

The bolt of lightning is thought to have struck a cable of the telephone company, as nearly every telephone bell on the north exchange was ringing.

A VICTIM OF HONOR.

M. Sarraut, Wounded in Duel With M. Pugliesi-Conti, Improving.

Paris, July 13.—The surgeons in attendance on M. Sarraut, who was wounded Friday in a duel with M. Pugliesi-Conti at Ville d'Avray, issued a bulletin today saying that their patient's condition was considerably improved. The dangerous stage, they say, has been passed, but complete repose has been ordered. A further examination of M. Sarraut will be made tomorrow in order to decide the gravity of the injury to the lung. M. Clemenceau and others of the cabinet ministers and M. Brisson, president of the chamber of deputies, visited M. Sarraut today.

The press continues its discussion of the Dreyfus case, but the subject of the public is waning. The closing of parliament and the departure on vacations of senators and deputies and the rapid exodus of Parisians for summer resorts, tends to relieve the former tension of the opposing elements.

ON MURDERER'S TRAIL.

Two Poses in Pursuit of John McPherson of Knoxville, Tenn.

Knoxville, Tenn., July 13.—John McPherson is a fugitive from justice, charged with the murder of Grant Smith, a former merchant of this city, and the fatal wounding of Deputy Sheriff William Walker, who attempted to arrest him. McPherson shot and killed Smith in the house of Nettie Hall, apparently without provocation. McPherson was accompanied by his father, Dr. Buck McPherson, and the two fled in a buggy toward the mountains. Deputy Sheriff Walker pursued them and demanded the surrender of young McPherson, who shot him through the lung. Walker will die. Young McPherson continued into the mountains, while his father returned here and surrendered and is now in jail.

BODY FOUND.

Helena, July 14.—Caught by driftwood along the bank of the river a mile from Dillon, the body of an unknown man, was found by two fishermen yesterday. The body was badly decomposed, and its features not recognizable. Two letters and a note, the latter evidently written by the dead man, were found in his clothing. The note states that the writer had been attached to the battleship Oregon, and had been transferred to Wisconsin on the Pacific coast,

whether he is believed to have been traveling when drowned. The note was written in Pennsylvania.

CONFESED THE MURDER.

Sebastopol, July 13.—A former sailor named Sheronko, who was arrested today, confessed that he was the murderer of Vice Admiral Chodkinn.

BRYAN LEAVES LONDON.

London, July 13.—William J. Bryan left here today. He will visit Oxford, Stratford-on-Avon, Edinburgh, Glasgow, Belfast, Cork and Dublin. He will return to London July 23, when he will go to Hawarden.
