

LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

THEATRE.—The performance last night was of a very satisfactory character, in "The Streets of New York," the various characters being personated with such excellence as to keep the interest of this long piece unflagging throughout.

To-night the beautiful comedy of "Self or High Life in New York" will be presented when the full strength and talent of the company will appear. Mr. and Mrs. Langrishe will personate the former "Mr. John Uait," a "Broadway" character, and "Mrs. A. Budget of Blunders," a "Fashionable Lady." This piece is an expose of the froth, frivolity, and lack of truth and sincerity prevailing in fashionable society, and affords scope for some excellent acting.

The performance will conclude with the farce, "A Budget of Blunders," which is enough to provoke the most stolid and phlegmatic to mirth and laughter.

SUICIDE.—On the morning of the 13th inst., Mr. John S. Burnett, one of the proprietors of the stage between Adams and Battle Mountain, suicided by shooting himself through the head, in his room at Slusher's hotel at the former place. From the evidence produced at the inquest, it appears that he had been laboring for some time, under great depression of spirits. He had been lately engaged in a shooting scrape with one of his drivers, named Black, for which he and Black were held in \$3,000 bonds. The idea that his bonds were about giving him up and that he would have to go to jail had preyed upon his mind and, it is supposed, caused him to commit the rash act.

VENISON FOR CHRISTMAS.—The Messrs. Voorhees Bros., of Mantel, Sanpete, yesterday brought into the city a wagon load of the finest deer, ever seen in the Territory, shot by them in Sanpete County. They were of the black-tailed variety, and one or two of the animals were above two hundred pounds each, with antlers not far from a yard long.

SMALL POX AT BURCH CREEK.—The small pox at Burch Creek has, up to date, attacked sixteen persons, all members of the Stephens family. "Doctor" Kyle who has them in charge pronounces them all, with the exception of Father Stephens whose death was announced last week, in a state of convalescence, and expects that in a few days they will have entirely recovered.—Ogden Junction, Dec. 14th.

ACCIDENT AT ST. GEORGE.—The following telegram was received this morning, per Deseret Telegraph line:

ST. GEORGE.—Mr. Loughery, the machinist, who is putting in operation the factory at Washington, was seriously injured in the right arm yesterday, by having it caught in the machinery. Doctor Higgins, of St. George, is in attendance; the wound, though serious, is not considered dangerous. Yesterday President Young and a party of citizens visited the cotton farm at Hesperia, which has not been cultivated for several years, in consequence of the loss of the dam in the Rio Virgin; much of the land formerly cultivated has been washed away by the floods. Arrangements are now making to rebuild the dam and enlarge the field for the cultivation of cotton. The party as arranged in a snow and rain storm. Mr. W. Young and R. NEW INVENTION.—We were shown yesterday a new hay and straw cutter at Zion's Co-operative Mercantile Institution, which pleased us, and which, we think, superior to any machine of the kind that has been offered for sale in our market. We are the more gratified in alluding to this cutter from the fact that it is manufactured at the City Creek Foundry, and is the invention of Mr. Ivar Isachsen, the superintendent of that foundry. Mr. Isachsen is one of our most ingenious mechanics, and is an inventor of considerable ability. His manufactured machines of this description in his native country, Norway, and they were so well liked there that the State of Norway was discarded. It appears to be a very strong, durable machine, and can be kept in repair, we should think, very easy. The hay and straw is cut by two knives, which revolve on a large wheel, and by an arrangement of cogs, the feed can be cut down coarse to suit the animals to be fed, whether horses or cows. The only danger about this machine is, that children, playing with it when fitted for use, might do themselves serious injury with the knives, but the inventor has provided for this by retaining and fastening the handle when the machine is left by the person who has it in charge, so that it cannot be turned. We understand Mr. Isachsen has made application to have the machine patented.

PRODUCTIONS IN NEVADA.—A fish ranch, where trout are artificially cultivated in full and successful operation near the town of Truckee. Another such establishment is in course of construction at the mouth of the Truckee river, near Lake Tahoe.—Reese River Reveille.

CALENDAR OF THEATRE.—The Oubian Troupe which has been giving concerts at Ogden lately, called to-day. He informs us that he has arranged for a series of concerts, in this city, to be given sometime next week.

We would recommend the adoption of a patent hive, combining all the advantages for convenience of handling and cheapness of manufacture, and would also recommend the bee-keepers of Utah to avail themselves of the information given in the Bee Journals—Beekeeping Journal and Agricultural Beekeeping, published by H. A. King & Co., N. Y., The Illustrated Bee Journal, published by N. C. Mitchell, of Indianapolis, Ind., and Secrets to Bee Keeping, by K. P. Klidder, all good and reliable publications.

WINTERING BEES.

They should be kept in a cool place, protected from the storms and wind. If the weather is very severe, they can be protected with a little straw or fodder. The entrance to the hive should be kept clean from snow or dead bees and other rubbish that may accumulate.

HONEY PRODUCING PLANTS.

Sweet clover, in our opinion, ranks first-class, producing a large amount of finely flavored honey. Red clover, also, produces a fine first-class honey, and is the best of the clovers. (Lemonard Cardiac) commonly known as motherwort, yields a large amount of sweet. Buckwheat is good in quantity, but second-class in quality. This season has been unfavorable for honey, from the fact that frost in the Spring destroyed the peach and many other honey-producing flowers. Besides the cold rains kept the bees in the hives to protect the young and did much damage to the honey resources, by destroying and poisoning the buds and flowers.

We will have submitted statements from some of the bee-keepers of the past season:

"I purchased one swarm of bees from W. D. Roberts; they swarmed about the 1st of July. I have since from them 140 pounds of honey, and at the close of the season they have in the new hive 111 pounds."

"I had a young swarm make 49 pounds honey in four weeks."

Signed EDWIN MORGAN.

"My bees were transferred into Kidder's hive June 24th; I have of surplus honey 110 pounds."

Signed A. H. DAVIS.

One swarm kept by Whiting, of Springville, Utah Co., paid a profit of \$135.00, estimating young bees \$25.00 per swarm and honey \$50.00 per pound.

Many other statements equal to the above could be given, but this we consider sufficient to place Utah second to no State or Territory in the Union for the culture of bees.
