Being the first day of the year, we thought we would like to communicate with friends and brethren with whom we have en-loved plany happy seasons through joyed many happy seasons through holicays, and at many other times upder varied circumstances.

Since our arrival in Liverpoo after two or three days' rest, Brc. George started to Louth, his birth-place, to visit relatives and friends,

while I proceeded to Birmingham, the place assigned us both to laber in as traveling elders, thinking to take a little time in the summer to visit my birthplace. I arrived in Birmingham November 30, made my way to Tenby Street, the con-ference house. Brother Wheeler, from Cottonwood, who presides here, was out visiting some of the branches.
