The officers having heard that the In diana and neurose were again processile after the battle of Thursday morning, approached the cabin of Chitti Harjo, which of the Snake clan, near Hickory Ground, without four of trouble. Every available run and practically all the ammuni-tion in fown were taken. In an hour 50 men were marching toward Hickory Ground. When the news reached Mus-hoges officers immediately issued a cell for men and a short time later a posse for men and a short time later a posse of 50 was ready to march. His confession also revealed for the first time the real secrets of generalship over the Creeks. He admitted that his father, whose virtues have been lauded, was actually in command of the In-dians in the field.

The troops hurrled on, after send-ing detachments in pursuit of each band, and placed bloodhounds on the trail of some of the Indian leaders. One large band of Indians retreated toward Flat Rock and another to Lenab.

The initial supplemented by numer-ous posses of deputy sheriffs and citi-zens, started out to complete a cir-cuit that would enable them to en-cordon Plerce at 6 o'clock, drive the Indian bands together and move in and crush them.

LONG DAY OF UNREST AND SKIRMISHING

Oklahoma City, Okla., March 28 -Darkness closed a day of unrest, un-easiness and desultory skirmishing easiness and desultory skirmissing throughout a large part of the former Creek nation, and with Indians and negroes of the outlaw band hidden in the fustnesses of the hills, 100 stats militiamen are tenting on the old camp ground of the fathers of this generation of creek Indians

Roy Hoffman, pitched their tents and will await orders for action tomorrow. Before leaving Henrictus this afternoon, Col. Hoffman made a request of Adjt.-Gen. Frank Canton that 500 more members of the state troops be held in readiness for a call. Col.
