He labored for several years in the construction of the Logan Temple, and on the 2nd of October, 1884, had the privilege of partaking of the blessings to be received in that holy house, at which time he was also married to Nellie Croft, who now sorrowfully survives him, becoming a widow at the early age of 17 years.

**SCOVILL**—Of consumption and old age, March 4, 1885, Sarah Ballow, wife of Amasa Scovill; born July 19, 1803; baptized in Michigan in 1860; came to Salt Lake City in 1862; lived at Mt. Pleasant, Sanpete County, until 1881, when she moved to Orangeville, where she died as she had lived, a true Latter-day Saint.

**COOMBS**—At Payson, Utah County, U. T., Fanny Coombs, beloved wife of Isaiah M. Coombs, March 14th, 1885, aged 42 years, 9 months and 8 days.

Deceased was the eldest daughter of Fanny Porter and Francis McLean, and was born in Sunderland, England, June 6th, 1842. She emigrated with her parents and two sisters to the United States in the year 1850; received the Gospel at Cincinnati, O., where she with her mother and sisters were baptized by Elder John Banks, April 24th, 1855. Her father had died two years previously. The family moved to St. Louis the same year that they received the Gospel, where deceased became acquainted with her future husband, who was laboring there as a missionary Elder from Utah. The family removed to Utah A. D. 1857, walking nearly the whole distance across the plains.

Deceased was married to Isaiah M. Coombs July 28th, 1858, at Spanish Fork. She was the mother of fourteen children, all living except three who died in infancy. At an early period in married life her character was vividly portrayed by the Patriarchs of the Church, who sealed upon her "The attribute of wisdom," "the gift of prudence," "the gift of rearing sons and daughters to God," "the gift of counsel in her family," "the attribute of faith," etc. They also told her she should dwell as a confidant in the bosom of her partner, and that she should "be a comfort and a consolation to him all the days of her life." Such is a brief sketch of her Patriarchal blessing, which she valued above all price, to which she clung with undying faith, and which was verified to the letter. To her husband, she was more than a wife; to her children more than a mother—she was a companion, a wise counselor. Every principle that God has revealed for the salvation and exaltation of man and woman was adopted by her in a spirit of self-sacrifice and sincere devotion, which endeared her not only to her family, but to all who knew her.

On her death bed, while in the greatest distress, she sang in a low, agitated voice that beautiful hymn commencing: "We thank thee, O God! for a prophet," showing that her faith was as strong in the hour of death as in the midst of health and life.

The funeral was largely attended, and consolatory remarks were made by Bishop C. D. Evans, of Salem, of Salt Lake City; Bishop John E. Booth, of Provo; Bishop Geo. Halliday, of Santaquin; Counselor D. Lant, of Payson, and President D. John, of Provo.
