LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

RECKLESS USE OF FIRE ARMS.—Yesterday
two boys who were celebrating the
Fourth by shooting off fire arms, directed
their guns at a valuable mule belonging to
Mr. Samuel Mallin of the 12th Ward. The
mule was being loaded with hay, and
was standing in the street. The boys, who
were armed with shotguns, fired at the
mule, and the animal, almost instantly
dropped dead, being shot through the
heart. The parents of the boys, who are
informed, have complained the matter
with Mr. Mallin. Another instance of the
impropriety of permitting children to handle
fire arms.

A CHILD EXPOSED TO DEATH.—Last
evening Brother and Sister Joshua Midgley
were on a visit at a friend's house in the
12th Ward, and, as they were returning,
they were attacked by the cries of an
infant in an adjacent lot. On proceeding
to the place whence the sounds came, a
male child was found lying on the ground
wrapped in a piece of cotton cloth. It was
a new-born infant, and had been left there,
judged, but a short time previously. They
found the tracks of the person who had
been there, and followed them to a street,
but did not trace them any further. They
carried the child to the house of Bro.
Wm. Evans, and with the aid of a midwife,
the child was revived. It was in a very
weak condition, and it is doubtful whether
it will survive. It is a very interesting
case, and it is hoped that the child will
be restored to its parents.

THE GLORIOUS FOURTH.—The day was
when a drinking house or a drunken man
was unknown in our city. Only yesterday
a gentleman of extensive travel in Europe,
Asia, Africa and America remarked he had
witnessed less drunkenness and disorder in
our city, attributable to our wholesome
rules and the vigorous energy with which
they are enforced, than in any city he had
ever traveled of a like size. But what a
change came before our vision as we
examined the Justice's docket of to-day, con-
taining thirteen drunkards, who had been
arrested, one of whom was fined fifty
dollars for assaulting a woman. Another
was bound over in the sum of one thousand
dollars to appear and answer to-morrow
morning on a charge of drunkenness, and
resisting an officer; while a number of
other cases were to follow for a hearing
this afternoon, making in the neighbor-
hood of twenty arrests during one day in
our quiet city.

WASHINGTON.

The Washington Treaty Ratifications to
be exchanged to-day between Presi-

WASHINGTON.—The ratifications of the
Treaty of Washington, which were
signed here by the U. S. and British
Commissioners on the 2nd inst., were
exchanged at London on the 17th ult.,
the anniversary of the battle of
Bunker Hill. The treaty will be pro-
claimed to-morrow, which is the anni-
versary of American Independence.

The Democratic members of the Ka-
kias Committee have summoned a
number of the representative men of
Georgia to testify before them.

There seems to be no doubt that the
President, on Thursday, decided not to
pardon Bowen. When Mrs. Bowen
called in the afternoon instead of seeing
him, he referred her to Attorney General
Cameron, who in turn referred her to
Attorney Fisher, who presented the case
before the Criminal Court, declined to

recommend pardon. The Attorney
General had prepared a paper in ac-
cordance with the President's view, but it
appears that Mrs. Bowen was successful
at Long Branch. The pardon is ex-
pected here to-morrow morning, and Mrs.
Bowen is anxiously awaiting it.

GEORGIA.

A negro outrage.

AUGUSTA.—On Saturday last twenty-
five armed negroes went to the plan-
tation of Angus Reed, about twenty-five
miles below Augusta. On arriving at
Reed's residence the party fired a vol-
ley into it, killing Thomas A. Lowe
and seriously wounding Reed, his
wife and mother. After disarming
Reed the negroes returned to Col. Ham-
mond's plantation, when the deputy
sheriff tried unsuccessfully to arrest
them, as they refused to disarm. The
negroes, promised to go to Aiken and
stand an investigation. One of the
parties implicated was arrested here
this evening. His version was that
Reed and Lowe attempted to chastise a
negro for stealing from the premises of
the former, but the negro escaped from
them and returned with the armed
band, who did the shooting by way of
retaliation. The affair causes uneasiness
and alarm.

NEW JERSEY.

Stricken with fever.

NEWARK, 3.—The grief of ex-Chan-
cellor Halsted, on hearing of the murder
of his son, Pat Halsted, yesterday,
was intense, and it is hardly possible he
can survive. He was last night incap-
able of being consoled, and wandered
from room to room in the house, moan-
ing piteously. He has employed a
private nurse, and is now in a
severe condition. He is worth
\$20,000, having realized fifty to a hun-
dred dollars a week from his business.
On the other hand, this is denied.

PRUSSIA.

Emperor William recovering.

Nuevitas for trial.

PACIFIC COAST DISPATCHES.

Streets, originating in a drunken row,
in which one was fatally cut, he is now
