### THE ELECTION AND ITS LESSONS.

As there was no opposition to the People's Ticket, the election yesterday was without excitement and in the City Hall, our reporter had but a light vote was polled. It takes some greater incentive than the mere duty of exercising a right to induce some people to go to the polls on election days. If there were any perceptible likelihoods of danger they would be up and doing, but in the absence of anything unusual, they see no necessity for exertion and are willing to let the power they hold remain dormant. Others, who are alive to the duties of citizens, seeing the necessity of being always ready and counting one on the right side at every opportunity, make it a point to put their votes where they will do the most good every time, cultivating the wise habit of using the ballot without fail.

But there was another reason besides the apathy of some of the voters why the vote yesterday was so light. Quite a number of citizens went away disappointed from the polling places because their names did not appear on the Registry List. This was the case at the election in 1878. At that time, in consequence of mistakes in copying, a great many names of persons who had been duly registered according to law were omitted from the list, they therefore could not vote, although they had to take him back.
