LONDON, 24.-A dispatch from
Constantinople says the Servians
attempted to carry Yatre by assault
and were repulsed with immense
loss. They were then driven to the

distant.

Beika Bay are expected to proceed
to the Gulf of Kolo.
It is expected the Russian head-
quarters will shortly be transferred
from Bogot to Serail, which is about
twenty-five miles south-west from
the former place.
The Grand Duke Nicholas has
been telegraphed from Bogot to Prince
Miles of Serbia, congratulating him
upon the successful opening of the
campaign by the Servians.
A Vienna correspondent says:
The commander of the Russian ad-
vanced corps has received orders to
remain on the defensive until re-
inforced by troops from the neighbor-
hood of Belgrade.
It is said that 25,000 men, with
70 cannons, lately passed Galatz.
Part of these crossed the Danube by
the small bridge, while the remain-
der went in the direction of the
Kalarash. It is thought these re-
inforcements will join General Zim-
merman, and operate against the
eastern side of the quadrilateral,
primarily against Silistria, while a
division of grenadiers and a division
of the reserve formerly before
Plevna will go to the aid of the
12th army corps for a siege of
Rustuk.
Grand Duke Nicholas will join
the army operating against Silistria.
The Carowitch is expected to
command the army destined to ad-
vance through the Balkans further
east, probably through the Trojan
Pass.
