

## FOUR SPEAKERS IN AFTERNOON

The Second Session of the Seventy-eighth General Conference Largely Attended.

### TIMELY INSTRUCTION GIVEN.

Follow in the Footsteps of the Master  
The Theme of the Various Discourses.

The second session of the conference convened in the tabernacle, commencing at 2 p. m. The meeting was called to order by President Joseph F. Smith, and the congregation and choir sang, "Our God We Praise To Thee." The opening prayer was offered by Elder Joseph E. Taylor, after which the congregation and choir again joined and rendered the hymn, "Praise To The Man Who Cometh With Jehovah."

ELDER DAVID O. MCKAY, of the quorum of apostles, was the first speaker. He quoted a phrase from the document read this morning to the effect that the purpose of Mormonism is religious, or spiritual, development. One way by which this development may be brought about is by resisting whatever within us tends to hinder spiritual growth. At baptism we agree to leave off whatever is not in harmony with the gospel, to bury all the sins, evils, and imperfections that belonged to that old life, and we were born again into the Church of Christ. This is what we all did, that is where we stood once, forgiven before heaven of our transgression. There was before us then a life of spiritual growth, and we sought the true religious development.

But along with the seeking of spiritual growth, there must be a strong power of resistance. Someone has said that when God makes a prophet he does not unmake the man. It is so with us all. Many times our weakness follows us after baptism. Satan endeavors to assail us by attacking our weakest point. It was thus with Jesus when he was tempted of the devil. At the moment when Christ was hungry, Satan said, "If thou be the Son of God, cause these stones to be made bread." And so it is with us. We are tempted through our weakest point. True the temptation does not come to us in the form in which it came to our Savior, but it does come. It may be that we are tempted to resume that old pipe which, at the waters of baptism, we agreed to lay aside. Have we the power to say, as Jesus said, "Get thee behind me, Satan?"

Elder McKay read from the eighty-ninth section of the Doctrine and Covenants, and commented thereon. He emphasized especially that part concerning the use of wine and hot drinks. The things mentioned in this revelation—spirituous liquors, tobacco, hot drinks—should, the speaker declared, be resisted by all those who wish truly to follow the line of spiritual development. Every young man should know that in order to grow spiritually he must resist the use of these things. He should realize that we become stronger and more able to resist other evils. Then, too, some times we imagine that because we are not particularly overcome by the use of wine, we may partake of it without much harm. But this is the moment where resistance is necessary. Temptation must be resisted in whatever form it appears, if there is to follow any real development.

Sister Edith Grant sang "Fear Not O Israel."

ELDER GEORGE F. RICHARDS, of the quorum of apostles, was the next speaker. He rejoiced in the fact that Christ came among the children of men and himself taught the gospel. He made himself an object lesson so far as concerns the principles of the gospel. He lived them out in his life. Jesus requires of us only that we follow in His footsteps. He rejoiced in the thought that we had so much recorded about the details of our Savior's life among men.

The speaker referred to the work accomplished by the Latter-day Saints. He thanked God that so great a number had heard and obeyed the gospel. The saints have made many sacrifices for the truth. They have left good homes, many of them, where they were respected, to join an unpopular faith; many of them have undergone sacrifices after they had converted themselves with the Church, and some had been required to lay down their lives for their convictions.

No true Latter-day Saint, no one who is in full standing in the faith, but is willing to do whatever is required of him. It is a mistaken idea that there is no agency among the saints so far as their labors in the Church are concerned, that they are coerced into doing this, that or the other thing. The exact contrary is true. Men and women are perfectly free to go as they choose, whether to do the right or the wrong. But once a man has been thoroughly converted to the truth, there is nothing he will not do for it. This is evident from the vast number of workers we have in the Church. And that these men and women are sincere, no one who has seen them can doubt. There is too much to show that they are sincere. The life of the whole people is an evidence of the same effect. The Latter-day Saints are not required to obey what they are not converted to, but when the saints are converted to anything they are willing to perform their duty.

Elder Richards bore testimony to the faithfulness of the saints in the stakes and in these parts of the world, which he had visited. He had traveled, he declared, 20,000 miles during the past year, and had seen many evidences of the faithfulness and integrity of the saints. He did not believe that very many of the young people would prove recreant to the faith of their fathers.

Elder George Albert Smith, next addressed the conference. The saints, he said, were looking forward to the time when they shall receive the reward of their works. The Lord has said that to please him we must have faith in him. The speaker wondered whether some did not imagine that because a law is temporal, it could be set aside and work to their spiritual good. The Word of Wisdom is an example of this. Who is there that does not know, even he that is at all, that to refrain from the use of tobacco will give us greater brain power than we should have otherwise. And so it is with the other things mentioned in the revelation. Elder Smith said he regarded the whole commandment as the counsel of a wise Father, a Father who has an interest in His children. The Lord in substance says to us, My children, these things are not good for you, if you refrain from using them you shall have my Spirit to be your companion. And we should be even more willing to accept this counsel than we would the advice of a wise father on the earth.

In these evils by which we are surrounded there is much that is transmitted from father to son. The Lord has declared that the sins of the fathers shall be visited upon the heads of their children. By not heeding the counsel of the Lord in this revelation

on the Word of Wisdom, we may transmit to our posterity weak bodies, which shall be unable to resist the encroachment of disease, where as we should give them such healthful bodies as will perpetuate our race to the remotest age. This revelation is too little observed. Let us teach it to our children that they may not be ignorant of what ever will tend to preserve them in strength of body and mind. He urged the saints to a faithful observance of this and other laws of God, so that the blessings which are promised us may be realized in our lives.

ELDER HYRUM M. SMITH.

Elder Hyrum M. Smith was the concluding speaker. He began by bearing testimony to the statements of President Smith concerning the Church at home and abroad. His experience in traveling among the saints enabled him to judge of their condition. He testified also that almost without exception, the authorities of the Church, general and local, see eye to eye. This is true also so far as the people are concerned. There are no disputes, for example, as to the place of the principles of the gospel. There is no difference as to which principle is first or second. We have received the testimony of the Spirit, who has borne witness to us of the same things. We, likewise, understand the law of tithing in the same way and receive it. This is an evidence that we have all drunk in of the same Spirit. If we have a weakness, the speaker said, that was probably regarding the Word of Wisdom. The saints do not keep this law as completely as they should.

The speaker warned the saints, men as well as women, against the evil of vanity. He thought that men are equally guilty of this sin as are women. They are anxious to wear the latest cut of trousers and latest fashions in clothes generally. The saints should guard themselves carefully against this very objectionable trait. Associated with this, however, are others even worse. He spoke particularly against Sunday theaters, dances, and skating parties. He believed in amusement, he said, but not when carried to excess. At present, he went on to say, there is a craze for the skating rink, not only on Sundays, but on every day of the week. He believed that there are dangers in all these things which may be turned aside by wise and judicious care. The saints will do well to heed the counsel of the leaders of the Church, as is evidenced abundantly by the past history of the people.

The session was concluded by the choir and congregation singing the hymn, "The Spirit of God Like a Fire is Burning," and was thereupon adjourned till Saturday morning at 10 o'clock. The benediction was pronounced by Elder Charles H. Hart.

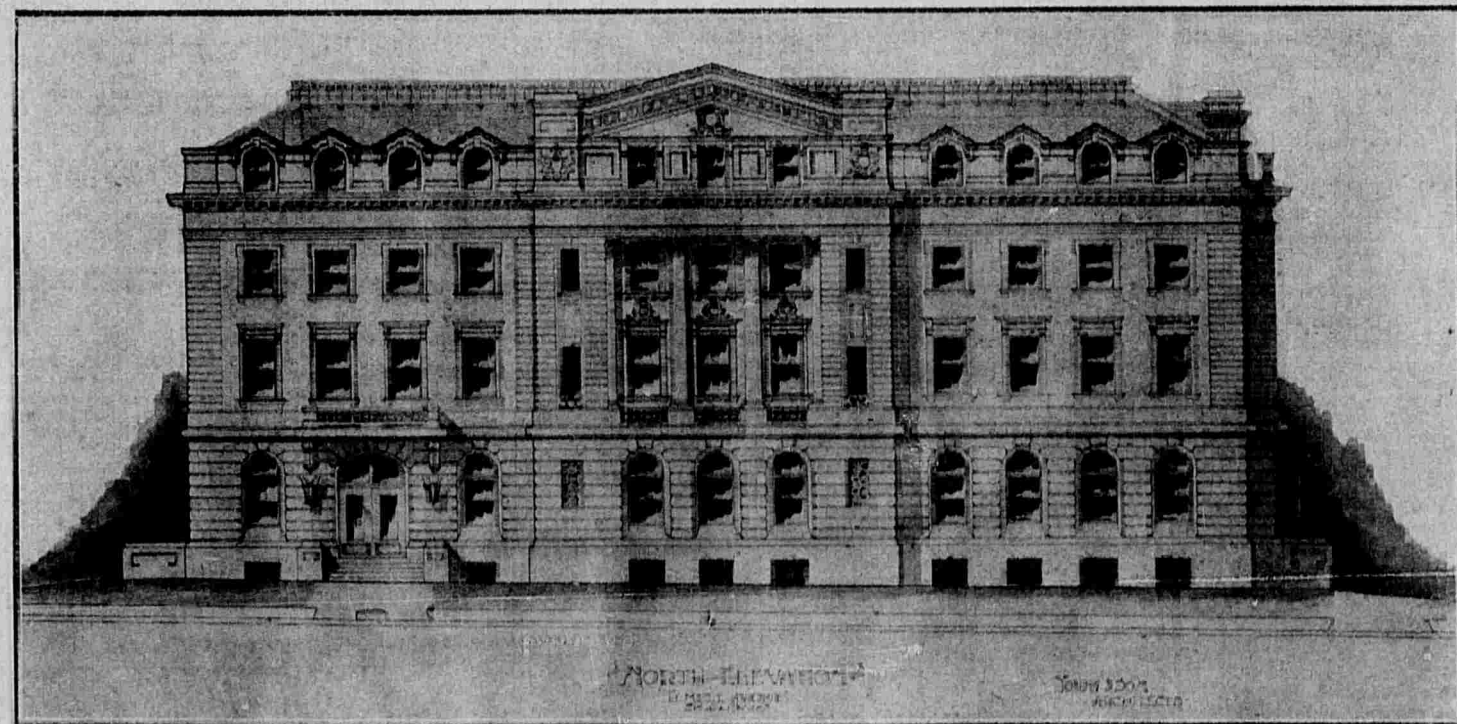

## THE NEW CHURCH ADMINISTRATION BUILDING.

Will Be Erected Opposite The Temple Block on the Corner of East Temple and Temple Avenue And Will Provide Headquarters for the Presiding Bishopric and Auxiliary Church Organizations.



The cuts here reproduced show the west and north fronts of the Church building shortly to be erected on the east side of Main street, immediately opposite the temple. Four separate ecclesiastical organizations will be provided with commodious quarters in the structure, and as work will be commenced at once, it is hoped the next semi-annual conference will see the presiding bishopric, the Relief society, the Young Ladies' Mutual Improvement association and the Primary association comfortably established in a new home.

The need of such a building has long been felt, as the bishops' office has been maintained in wholly inadequate quarters, and the other three societies have had no domicile whatever. In the early part of the present year plans and specifications were asked for, prices of \$100, \$75, \$50 and \$25 being offered for first, second, third and fourth honors, the four to become the property of the bishops' office. This was done in order that, if thought advisable, superior points in each might be incorporated in the one selected as the principal guide in the structure.

The site plans submitted were of a very high order, and it was a somewhat difficult matter to make selections. Finally, however, it was decided to accept four, in the following order, first, Young & Son; second, Rutherford Hansen; third, Dallas & Hedger; fourth, Cannon & Cannon. Thus the building will be erected from the specifications of Messrs. Young & Son, with such modifications as shall be deemed advisable by the presiding bishop.

The structure will have a 34 1/2 foot frontage of 99 and a Temple avenue frontage of 120 feet, to be set far enough back that the steps will commence at the inner line of the sidewalk. Four stories and a basement will constitute

the building. The basement and first story will be occupied by the presiding bishop's office, with its various departments, while the second, third and fourth stories will be the homes of the Relief society, the Y. L. M. I. A. and the Primary association, respectively.

The basement will be of red sandstone, the material for which is already on the ground, and will be absolutely fireproof. The other floors are to be adapted for offices and assembly halls, and are to be finished in hard wood and

supplied with all modern conveniences and accessories. The walls above the sandstone basement will be built of the same quality of buff brick, with granite trimmings, the stone work to be of the style known as ashlar. The roof will be flat.

A contract has been signed with Young & Son for the building and completion of the structure, and they obligate themselves to personally oversee every detail of construction. It is expressly required in the contract that so

far as possible home material be used in the building, and that none but local labor be employed.

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## FOUR DIVORCES ARE GRANTED

Judge Morse Sets a Quartet of Miserable Couples Free From Bondage.

### MRS. WACH'S UNHAPPY LIFE.

Husband Treated Her Brutally and On One Occasion Kicked Her Out of Bed.

Four divorces were granted by Judge Morse yesterday afternoon during the regular weekly divorce call and only one of the cases was contested. Lena Wach was granted a divorce from Emil Wach on the grounds of cruelty and failure to support. They were married at Logan on June 29, 1903, and Mrs. Wach testified that her husband began treating her cruelly within six months after their marriage. She declared that he frequently came home drunk and abused her and on one occasion he kicked her out of bed. She said that she stood his treatment as long as she could and in June last she packed up her trunk and went back to Logan. Wach denied all of the charges made by his wife but the court granted her a divorce and ordered their home sold and one-third of the proceeds given to Mrs. Wach, one-third to their minor child and the other third to the defendant.

Theodore Eisenbarth was divorced from Adeline Eisenbarth on the ground that the defendant is insane and has been confined in an insane asylum since May, 1899. They were married in Cleveland, O., on Dec. 31, 1905.

On the grounds of desertion and non-support, Dora J. Brennan was granted a divorce from John J. Brennan, whom she married on Feb. 2, 1905. Plaintiff was awarded the custody of their child and \$25 per month as alimony.

Sophia Armstrong was granted a decree of divorce from Frank A. Armstrong on the ground of desertion. The parties were married on Nov. 2, 1897, and have one child, the custody of which was awarded to Mrs. Armstrong.

### CLAIMS FALSE AFFIDAVIT.

P. E. Parsons Enters Suit Involving Service of a Summons.

In an action filed in the district court yesterday afternoon by P. E. Parsons against the Utah Implement company and Judge J. J. Whitaker of the city court, it is alleged that George R. Hill, an employee of the company, made a false affidavit of service of summons upon Parsons in a suit filed against him in the city court. It is alleged that the implement company filed suit against Parsons and his partner, M. L. Shaw, in the city court and the summons was given to Hill to serve. He made a return on the summons that he had

served it by leaving a copy with Eliza Dorrity at Parsons' home. Upon that service a default judgment was rendered against Parsons on June 13, 1907, for the sum of \$62.32. Parsons now alleges that Hill did not leave a copy of the summons at his home and that his affidavit of service of summons is wholly false. It is therefore claimed that the judgment so rendered is illegal and it is asked that Judge Whitaker be restrained from turning over the money secured on execution issued in the case and that an order to show cause be issued against the company and the judge. The order was issued and is returnable next week.
