LOCAL BRIEFS.

Bank Clearings.—Today's local bank clearings amounted to \$676,543.58 as against \$585,198.26 for the same day last year.

Studying Weather.—A class of students from the University summer school visited the local weather office yesterday afternoon, to study the system of gathering meteorological data.

Want Tooole Water.—Neff Bros. of this city have applied to the state engineer for 15 second feet of water from the confluence of the Lost Creek in Tooole county to irrigate 320 acres of land.

Worried by a Dog.—Harry Horsely, the veteran actor, is out again after having been confined to his house for several days suffering from the effects of being severely bitten in the legs by a vicious dog at East Waterloo.

Searching for a Brother.—J. L. Bunting of St. George, writes: Russell Chandler of St. George, Utah, would like to learn of his brother, Zachariah Andrew Jackson Chandler, who when last heard from was residing at Jefferson county, Illinois.

Specialist Operates.—Dr. G. V. I. Brown, the Milwaukee specialist on harp and cleft palate, performed an operation yesterday afternoon, at Holy Cross hospital, on the cleft palate of a child, and a similar operation was performed this morning, by the same expert.

On Franklin Avenue.—Robert Skelton of Provo has bought the premises, 223-224 Franklin avenue, this city, where he will remove the business of the Skelton Publishing company which has been in Provo since 1887. The price paid for the property was \$11,000.

Amends Its Articles.—The Great Western Mill and Building company of this city has filed an amendment to its articles of incorporation in the county clerk's office by which its capital stock is increased from \$4,000 to \$20,000 divided into shares of the par value of \$10 each.

Going to Castile.—The Veteran Volunteer Firemen's association is planning on a fine time at its excursion to Castile Springs on Aug. 5. The old firemen and their friends will be out in full force and everything possible has been done by the committee in charge of the excursion to show them a good time.

Civil Service Exams.—There will be civil service examinations in this city, Aug. 8, for the position of veterinary inspector, bureau of animal industry, department of agriculture, with salary at \$1,200 per annum. There will also be civil service examination on Aug. 22, for the position of tracer with the Panama commission, at \$33.23 to \$100 per month.

Atty. Smith Arrested.—Atty. James F. Smith was arrested yesterday, at the instance of C. F. Christensen, on a charge of obtaining money under false pretenses. Smith presented a check to the station man, which bore the signature of "C. W. Bird," who is said to be a fictitious person. The accused was released on his own recognizance and will answer before Jus. of the Peace Dana T. Smith.

Organ Recital.—There was an unusually large audience in the Tabernacle yesterday afternoon, in attendance on the organ recital, and the interest was such that the recital, applause was forgotten. The performance of "Jerusalem the Golden" was of special excellence. There will be no recital Tuesday, on account of its being Pioneer day, but the regular recital is on for the following Friday.

Lakes Oil Pavements.—City Engineer Kelsey, during his recent visit in California, investigated the oil pavements and roads in that state and was very favorably impressed with them. He will recommend to the city council that some experiments be made along the line of oil macadamized streets in this city. He says that the cost is much less than asphalt, and that it saves the expense of sprinkling with water every day.

Powell Machine Co.—Articles of incorporation of the Powell Machine company of this city have been filed in the county clerk's office. Its capital stock is \$20,000, divided into shares of the par value of \$100 each. W. E. Ware is president; J. J. Powell, vice president; A. O. Trenggan, treasurer; L. E. Riter, secretary. The company will manufacture and sell an improved wood-embossing machine patented by J. J. Powell of Logan.

Sharp the Victor.—The local United States land office decided yesterday afternoon, in favor of D. J. Sharp in the latter's contest with William McK. Thome in the local contest. Involving the right to purchase a southeast quarter, section 7, township 13 south, range 10 east. Mr. Thome alleged prior possession and prior filing, but the land was awarded to Mr. Sharp on the ground that he had complied with the law as to development, while the other party had not.

Ran Over a Child.—Officer Schultz yesterday arrested Alvin White, a 16-year-old employee at the Salt Lake Hardware, for violating the bicycle ordinance by riding on the sidewalk, and thereby knocking down and injuring the 4-year-old daughter of the arresting officer. The little one was returning home after adding her father goodbye, when the wheelman ran over her. He was seized by the child's mother and held until Mr. Schultz returned and took him to police headquarters. Young White will answer before Judge Willis Brown of the juvenile court.

Suggestion by Visitor.—Joseph Redman, of Omaha, father of Ben F. Redman of this city, who is visiting with his son, suggests that a head be placed immediately above the light of the Brigham Young statue as under existing circumstances the upper portion of the monument is in darkness after daylight. "I am a great admirer of Brigham Young," he said this morning, "for I knew of the Mermon when I resided at Florence, Neb., and can remember when the famous hand-carry party left that place. I would like to see the upper portion of the monument illuminated something after the fashion of the Logan monument in Chicago. Salt Lake should take pride in her historic features because they are an asset worth preserving and beautifying. There is no other city in the west so interesting to me as Salt Lake, and that holds good with practically everyone who passes through this city."
