Dynamite Suspected. A few days ago we published an account of the explosion of the boiler of a saw mill near Prescott, Arizona, which resulted in the killing of several

men. The following from Prescott, dated November \$2, suggests a terrible suspicion

> The funeral of J. B. Akers took place today under the auspices of the Masonic order.

A new aspect has been put on the explosion. Witnesses at the inquest swore that they heard two explosions, one closely following the other. It is now thought that dynamite or some other terrible explosive was placed in or upon the boiler, and caused the dis-

tity of tobacco and cigarettes and half a dozen cans of beef. The bur-glary was probably committed early A man named Louis Beck is susected of doing this, and he and Mr. Wilson, the proprietor of the mill, had had some trouble over some land owned by Beck, and from which he claimed Wilson was cutting timber.
