



The result of this action, it is said, will completely 'tie up the street car service in the city, close hotels, manu-facturing establishments, business, and even saloons where the use of tele-phones has not been discontinued United States Judge W. H. Hunt, who will return from New York to-morrow, will at cnce be called upon to consider a suit in equilty against the Montana Federation of Labor, the ob-ject of which is to secure a permanent injunction against the federation to prevent the boycotting of business houses in the state of Montana where telephones are in use. A similar suit

Judge Hunt at that time granted a temporary restraining order, which is returnable on next Monday. The tole-phone company now makes the charge that the federation has ignored Judge Hunt's order and should be adjudged guilty of contempt of court.

TRAIN DERAILED.

Thirty-two Passengers Injured on the Southern Railway.

Southern Railway. Washington, Serit. 22.—Thity-two pas-sengers were injured, none seriously, by the denaliment of the Chattanooga and Washington Limited train on the Southern railway, just north of Ryan'8 Siding. Va., early today. A broken rail was the cause of the accident. The entire train, composed of a baggage car, day coach and three sleepers, left the track, the sleepers being almost destroyed by first. A special train was quickly made up and proceeded to this city with all the passengers of the lim-ited. The wreck blocked the track for several boors, all trains meantime be-ing detained.

## RUSSIA WANTS COALING STATION NEAR PANAMA.

Washington, D. C., Sept. 21.—The state department is not yet informed of the reported desire of Russia to secure a coaling station in the neigh-borhood of the isthmus of Fanama. As the nearest point on the Brazilian coast to the isthmus is about 1,000 miles distant, a coaling station there would be of very little service to Rus-sian vessels passing through the Fan-ama canal.


