THE SERVIAN REFUGEES.

BELGRADE, 28.—The Servian authorities are endeavoring to induce the refugees from Bosnia and Bulgaria to return home. The refugees sent several deputations to the government, asking permission to remain until affairs are more settled. A deputation from the refugees in Ushitz district asserted that some of their number, relying on the Turkish promises, returned to their homes, but were massacred. The native Servians fear that the government will allow the refugees to remain and occupy large tracts of waste land. They are, therefore, plotting all they possibly can to prevent their suffering fellow Christians from taking possession of it.
