LOCAL BRIEFS.

City Engineer George Ritter will at once prepare plans for the Wasatch drive bridge over City Creek, for which the city council appropriated \$500.

Local business houses are agreeing to decorate on Purple Day, July 27, and the Elks will give three prizes, \$50, \$25 and \$15 for the best dressed windows.

The White Cross Sanitarium and City Emergency hospital has been established at 253 south West Temple street, and will be ready for business in a few days.

An amendment to the articles of incorporation of the Taylor Steam Laundry has been filed in the county clerk's office, in which the name is changed to the Model Steam Laundry.

The Commercial club committee on parks and public improvements will meet at 8 o'clock this evening, to discuss means for raising the \$5,000 necessary to complete the Wasatch boulevard.

Tom McCoy and a young man named Brown were each fined \$2 by Judge Elmer this morning for just driving at Liberty Park. Judge Ditch says that hereafter those convicted of this offense will be fined heavily.

U. S. Senator George Sutherland has received word from the bureau of pensions at Washington, that the \$12 per month pension of Mrs. Alice M. Todd had been allowed, dating from Nov. 27 last. Mrs. Todd's son Edgar died from disease contracted in the Philippines during the Spanish war.

- JULY 8th 121-Kihou Yale, founder of Yale college, died born in New Haven, 1048. 150-Fitz-Green Hallack, poet, was born in Guilford, Conn., died in 1861. 182-Perce Byassha Shelley was drowned in the bay of Spezia, born 1792. The circumstances of Shelley's death were peculiarly tragic. He left England in order to retain the custody of his child by Mary Godwin and settled in Italy. A boat in which he sailed from Leghorn disappeared during a sudden squall, and the poet's body was washed ashore. 185-Gen. Frank P. Blair, noted Federal veteran, died in St. Louis, born 1811. 188-The Grand Duke George, brother of the czar and heir to the throne, died at St. Petersburg, born 1857. 191-Gen. Okuyama Japanese army occupied Kailping.
