Bowman in the police court yesterday afternoon on the charges of drunkenness and vagrancy.

Dirty and betrayed, their brains benumbed by the use of poisonous drugs and whisky, stunned and forsaken, they pleaded guilty to the charges against them. The Morton woman was found by the police in a hotel on Plum Alley where she was consorting with Chinamen. She is not only a morphine addict but is addicted to the use of opium. She was unable to stay out the session of court and after being tied back to jail went to have a plea of guilty entered for her. As an act of mercy more than anything else, Judge Bowman sentenced her to a term of 90 days in the city jail, where she will be unable to get morphine or opium and there is a chance, a bare chance, she will be cured of the habit.

The Schoppe woman has been in court many times before, charged with vagrancy, drunkenness and other offenses. She has been arrested on several occasions and is now in the city jail. When the woman is presented before Judge Bowman she is bound to her seat and remarked: "You can't make me here all winter for all I care."
