

THE VOICE OF THE SHEPHERD.

SEVIER SIDE, Jan. 2, 1868.

Editor Deseret News:—Seeing an article in your paper a short time ago, on sheep raising, I thought a few words from us would not be uninteresting. We have got over 2,000 head of sheep in our charge, from Utah County. We have herded them all last summer and up to the present time. We separated the flock last spring and herded the bucks by themselves, which, in my opinion, is the best way, for lambs coming at this time of the year are not so good, even if they live. There are a few ewes having lambs now, but the most of them will have their lambs in April and May. The bucks were herded near Goshen settlement last summer, and got leave to run in the field in the Fall, and now they are the poorest sheep in the herd, while those which have been kept in the mountains all the time are fat and good. Take them as a whole, the flock looks well; they are healthy and clean, and disease has very nearly disappeared from amongst them. We are on the north side of the Sevier river, on the sunny side of the hills. We move our camp every two weeks. There is plenty of feed, with snow two inches deep. Concerning the quality of the wool and the constitution of the sheep, etc., we will leave the future to speak for itself. But we are of your opinion, and think we have as good a country for raising sheep as anybody, and we cannot see any reason why we cannot have as good a quality of wool.
