# MURDER REVIVED

Sheriff Harmon Believes George H. Wrig t Has Been Captured In West Virginia.

REQUISITION FOR HIS RETURN.

Papers Issued by Acting Governor Tingey Late Yesterday Afternoon -Story of the Crime,

Acting Governor C. S. Tingey has ssued requisition papers for the return to this state of George H. Wright, who is wanted in Utah county for the murder of three boys at Pelican Point in February, 1895. The papers were issued at the request of Sheriff J. M. Harmon of Provo, and are directed to the governor of West Virginia, as it is thought that the man recently arrested at Williamson, in that state, on suspicton, is Wright, for whom the officials have been looking ever since the mur-

A deputy sheriff has already been with the man will be brought back to Provo to answer for his crime. STORY OF THE CRIME.

In February, 1895, Albert H. Eng-strom, Alfred Neilsen and Albert John-son were killed at Pelican Point and their bodies were thrust under the ice in Utah lake. Harry Hayes was charged with the murder and was convicted. After being sentenced to death for the crime, his attorneys succeeded in establishing his innocence, and he was pardoned by the state board of

WRIGHT SKIPPED OUT.

Wright took advantage of the time consumed in the trial of Hayes and made his escape. Several times it was thought that he was captured in different parts of the United States, but it always proved to be the wrong man. It is now thought by Sheriff Harmon that the officials at Williamson have the right man, Wright is well educated and has been admitted to the bar. PHOTOGRAPH SENT. Shortly after the requisition papers had been issued word was received from the officers at Williamson, to the effect that a picture and description of the man arrested had been forwarded to the officials here, and advising that the sending of an officer for the party in custody be delayed until the picture and description should be received.

#### STATE ARMORY SOLD.

P. H. Lannan Buys Hom of National Guard for \$30,000.

There was an important real estate deal affected in this city yesterday afternoon, in the sale of the old state armory building, at the corner of Market and West Temple streets, to P. H. Lannan for \$30,000. The grantors and former owners are New York parties represented by ex-United States Mar-shal Glen Miller who conducted the

The property covers 75 feet front on West Temple street and 255 feet on Market street, and the building is the well known two story brick shack that has done ineffective duty as a state armory since the circular brick building armory since the circular brick building further up West Temple street was used years ago. The armory has long been a source of complaint because of its unfitness for the purpose for which it was used; but as the Legislature has now seen fit to do something the guard is to have a new building, and that at no late day either.

### EDWARDS NOT GUILTY.

Jury Agrees That He Was Too Drunk To Be Responsible.

The jury in the case of the State of Utah against John Edwards, which was tried in the criminal division of the district court yesterday before Judge Armstrong, returned a verdict of not guilty. Edwards was charged with burglarizing the home of J. B. Caldwell on south East Temple on the night of March 21. Attorneys Willard Hamer and George Buckle defended him and secured an acquittal on the ground that the man was too drunk to know what he was doing and hence there was no element of intent connected with his act. The verdict was quite a victory for the young attorneys as Edwards was positively identified by Mr. Caldwell as the man who pried open a window in his residence and open a window in his residence and gained entrance. The man took nothing from the house.

## JUDD APPOINTED.

Will Supervise Utah Fruit Exhibit at Portland Fair.

As was indicated in last evening's 'News," the Lewis & Clark commission at its meeting yesterday afternoon appointed Thomas Judd, president of the state board of horticulture, as director of the fruit exhibit to be sent to Portland from this state. The work of preparing an exhibit will be started at once by Mr. Judd, and it is expected that Utah will carry off a number of prizes in the horticultural displays. The model concentrating plant, which attracted so much attention at St. Louis, will be shipped to Portland at once, and it will probably be installed next week under the supervision of Prof. R. H. Bradford, director of the mineral exhibit from this state.

ture at Unity Hall. There was a fair sized audience at the opening musical lecture on "Das Rheingold" by Prof. Rubin Goldmark last evening, in Unity hall; but had the Sait Lake musical public under-

The lecturer prefaced his effort with a talk on Wagner and his treatment of the Norse legends and myths, and on his struggles to establish the music drama, with the music as the interpre-ter of the drama. The never ending strife of humanity, as depicted in "Das Rheingold" and the remainder of the tetrology, was portrayed, and the fact set forth that the legends of the Norsemen are no meaningless fairy tales, but rather the religion of a people in the infancy when their belief in their mythological religion was real enough to them.

Prof. Goldmark designated the vari-Prof. Goldmark designated the various motifs, or themes, as he continued in his lecture, playing the same on the piano of which he appears to be a master, taking up the song of the Rhein maidens, the appearance of the first evil in the form of Alvaric, and the theft of the gold, he traced the story through all its changes till the surrender of the ring of the Nebilung by Wotan and the final entrance of the gods into Wal Halla.
