Forty-five Officials Report Districts Free from Infectious Disease.

The September bulletin of the Utah state board of health contains a schedule of the contagious and infectious diseases reported from 127 local health officers in 25 counties, 45 of whom report their communities free from all contagious and infectious diseases, and 30 free from all but typhold fever. The bulletin in detail is as follows:
