Run today is 8,000 head, mar-ket strong to a shade higher, stock cat-tle a little higher, and prospects for a good week are promising. Sheep and lamb prices lost 20 to 30 cents Monday and Tuesday, account of liberal runs at all points, but the loss was just about made up later in the week, as the supply was short after Wednesday. The run is good today at 10,000 head, but market is steady and active, with the season's top figures pald today for wethers and ewes, name-ly \$5.90 and \$5.60 respectively. Year-lings sold today at \$6.80, and lambs at \$7.65, but neither of these prices are a full test of the market, as prime stuff would probably command 10 cents more in each class. Shippers and feeders apparently have confidence in future prices, as not very much partly fin-ished stuff came in last week as might be expected in view of the high prices. Bulk of sales are within a range of 50 to 75 cents in each class, with the pos-sible exception of lambs.
