NEW COAL COMPANY FORMED.

Judge Howell Grants Two Divorces—Pressmen Want Union—Traveler Meets Painful Accident.

Ogden, Sept. 21.—The ovation given the Salt Lake Opera company at the grand opera house last evening was immense. The company is deserving of every bit of applause and the encore it received last evening from the great crowd that packed the building, the receipts ran over \$700 and broke all previous records of the company. NEW COAL COMPANY.

Article Filed for the Utah and Rock Springs Corporation.

Ogden, Sept. 21.—Articles of incorporation of the Utah and Rock Springs Coal company have been filed with the county clerk. The company is formed for a period of 50 years and will make Ogden City the principal place of business. It is capitalized for \$10,000 divided into shares of the par value of one each, and the capital stock is fully paid up. The company is organized for the purpose of owning, leasing, operating and equipping coal mines, coal bins and coke ovens.

The articles set forth that the stock is fully paid up and the transfer of the company or of certain contracts dated Aug. 16, 1901, between the Rock Springs and Wyoming Coal company, and Andrew Thauman whereby he came into possession of the properties that are owned or for shipment of coal. The officers are Andrew Thauman, president and treasurer; Matilda L. Thauman, vice president; G. L. Becker, secretary, and they form the board of directors.

TWO DIVORCE SUITS.

Two divorce suits were heard in the district court by Judge Howell.

Caroline Smith against William R. Smith was the first tried. The testimony went to show that the couple were married in England Sept. 8, 1892, and two years later came to Utah. That in 1902 defendant deserted his wife, and two children, and has failed to provide for them. A decree of divorce was granted and custody of the children awarded the mother.

The case of Elizabeth Bradley against Thomas H. Hovey was heard and defendant, the wife, on the grounds of drunkenness and cruel treatment, permanent alimony in the sum of \$25 was granted. They were married at Ogden Jan. 7, 1903.

PRESSMEN'S UNION.

A meeting of the printing pressmen of Ogden was held last evening for the purpose of making arrangements for a charter from the International Pressmen and Assistants' Union of North America. Vice President W. L. Murphy of the International union was present and addressed the members. The organization starts out under favorable conditions. The officers elected for the ensuing year are Thomas Chatterlain, president; John Thomas, vice president; A. F. Martin, secretary and treasurer.
