ARE WE DOING RIGHTLY IN UTAH.

The mode of dealing with the Mormon peculiar institution, which the government has adopted and is now practicing, is an unpleasant instance of how laws may be wrested and perverted from their original intent, and how gross injustice may be done in the endeavor to conquer an established state of society by applying to it the legal standard of a morality it does not accept. Abhor the custom of polygamy as much as we may; denounce its originators, upholders and practicers; call it systematized adultery; stigmatize the people who consider it a part of religion, as sensual and ignorant; yet there it is -a fact. Above forty years ago this sect had its petty beginning; a quarter of a century ago its members founded in a desert their community. They have made it thriving and vigorous. During this time, and until within a few years, polygamy grew from rare into frequent occurrence, though by no means in proportion to the great increase of population, Families, the result of these "plural marriages" (as they themselves term them), have been From long experience and acquaintance with they themselves term them), have been the business, and the determination to be mod- formed and filled with children, now all the way from babyhood to young manhood and womanhood, in the due course of nature.

Now comes the stern hand of law to repress this oriental institution, with its bold insult to the spirit of the age and the moral sense of the nation; finds a statute against adultery enacted by the Mormons themselves, and the most stringent one, we are told, existing anywhere; turns it upon "plural marriage," which under their law is not adultery, but just as truly honorable matrimony as the monogamic union of the Christian world; and packs the juries who are to try the polygamists arrested under this statute, to insure conviction. What conviction means in any of these cases, is the branding of one or two or more honest women, the subsequent wives of a polygamist, as mere concubines; and the casting upon the children of such wives the stigma of illegitimacy. Is not this case hard? and is this treatment just?

The undiscriminating will perhaps accuse us of apologizing for the peculiar institution in presenting the issue in this light. We intend nothing of the sort. But the mode of warfare against it which we have above described is obnoxious to every instinct of honor and fairness. There is a better
