Besides, war sometimes breaks out unexpectedly, as it has in the history of nations, and the fate of nations does not rest ultimately with its destinies. The law of destruction is also visited by the Almighty for the purpose of clearing the nations of the impurity that threatens to inundate them. For these reasons it is not easy to foresee what the outcome will be. In the meantime, it cannot be the least desire of all who love peace, that a solution may be found of the existing troubles in harmony with the principles of justice and humanity.
