

Cause of Action."—This is the first returned this morning at 10 o'clock, in the case of Oliver Osterman, Phillips et al., for false imprisonment, which was given to the jury last evening. The verdict was returned, sealed. The gist of Judge Hoge's charge to the jury was that they should find if the defendants maliciously deprived of his liberty the plaintiffs, that the latter exceeded their authority in arresting him, or had no such reasonable cause for suspecting plaintiff of complicity in the robbery of the cattle, that it was incumbent upon them to return a verdict to find a verdict for the defendant. But if, on the other hand, he found that the act of depriving him of his liberty was not due to malice, but that the defendants will, that the defendants, Phillips, Bart and Hyde, were acting as officers in the discharge of duty, and at the time had reasonable cause for suspecting the plaintiff of complicity in the stealing, and had not exceeded their authority in causing his imprisonment, the jury should find for the plaintiffs, and return a verdict to cause of action. The foregoing above, shows how the case was regarded by the jury.
