

made a very clean break from the portion standing. Almost the only signs of the smash are the ends of the rails on which the trains ran which are torn asunder. The rails remaining are wrenched out of their chairs for a few yards.

A dispatch dated Cabul, 27th, says: Gen. Baker has gone to Kohistan with a force consisting of 1,700 infantry, a regiment of cavalry and four guns, to punish the insurgents there. Mahommed Jan has taken Musa Kahn with him to Wardok. The country about Cabul is rapidly becoming quiet.

The Viceroy of India telegraphs that Col. Norman has been attacked at Gandamak by Azmatullah Khan, with 2,000 followers. The enemy was driven off. The British loss is one officer and one man killed. Colonel Norman will advance at once and re-occupy Lataban.

Reports are current at Bristol today that the steamer *Arragon*, from New York, Nov. 30, for Bristol, had foundered in the Atlantic and all on board lost. Her owners at present know nothing of any disaster to the vessel.

Severe gales on Sunday extended to Newcastle, Stranraer, Greenock, Yarmouth, Liverpool and Plymouth. Much damage was done on land and to shippers, including the loss of a French barque and eight men.

The weather is milder here and on the continent. At Paris it is thawing after thirty-two days of frost, during which the thermometer touched eight degrees below zero, the coldest weather on record there.

A Lahore dispatch says: The Afghans who attacked Gen. Roberts at Shipur on the 23d inst., numbered 6,000. The ground around Shipur is thick with corpses of the slain.

Capetown, 30.—A meeting of Boers took place on the 10th inst., from which trouble was anticipated in some quarters, but it dispersed quietly after adopting a resolution to maintain the demand for the independence of Transvaal, and to elect a Volksraad. Paul Kruger was chosen to the leadership and was instructed to summon the Volksraad. The meeting was earnest, quiet and orderly. Another meeting to take place on the 6th of April was provided for.

Sir Garnet Wolseley, Supreme Military and Civil Commander in Natal and Transvaal, at a public dinner in Pretoria, said henceforward Transvaal would be regarded as a crown colony.

Madrid, 30.—As the King and Queen of Spain were driving through the gate of the Royal Palace this evening, a young man, dressed as a workman, fired a shot from a revolver at the royal carriage, but his aim was bad and nobody was hurt. The ball has since been found and weighs one ounce. It passed close to the head of one of the royal footmen. King Alfonso was driving at the time. The would-be assassin was immediately arrested and has confessed his crime. His name is Gonzales, aged 19, a waiter by occupation, and native of Galicia.

The *Diario Espanol* says: Two shots were fired at the royal carriage, the second passing quite close to the Queen's face. The weapon was a double-barreled pistol. The diplomatic body have gone to the palace to congratulate their majesties upon their escape. The attempt excites general indignation at Madrid. It is believed that Gonzales had accomplices, and three persons have been arrested on suspicion. Gonzales has been living at Madrid some time. King Alfonso attended the opera at night.

Senior Ayala, president of the Chamber of Deputies, is dead.

The present session of the Cortes will close when the bill for the abolition of slavery is disposed of. The new session will begin in March.

Great floods occurred in the Canary Islands on the 21st inst. Houses and crops are destroyed.

A telegram from Novi Bazar announces that the agitation in Bosnia and Herzegovina is assuming serious proportions, owing to the tyranny of Austrian officers. Four thousand Albanians are ready to resist thecession of Gasinje and Plava to Montenegro. Ahmed Mukhtar Pasha's troops are mutinous. They have not been paid and are in rage.

The difference between the British Ambassador and the Porte regarding the arrest and sentence to death of the priest who had been convicted of being the author of tracts hostile to the religion of Islam, will be satisfactorily arranged.
