FUNERAL OF J. M. EGGLESTON.

Impressive Services in Fifth Ward Meetinghouse-City Loses Damage Suit in District Court.

Ogden, Utah, March 20 .--- The excellency of the Utah State School for the Deaf and Blind which is known all over the United States, is indicated by the following extract from a letter received by Supt. F. M. Driggs from Prof. Thomas S. McAloney, formerly superintendent of the deaf and blind school at Boulder, Montana, but now school at Boulder, Montana, but now one of the instructors in the Western Pennsylvania institution for the blind at Pittsburg, who has visited the Utah school three times: "It has been my pleasure since coming east to testify a number of times concerning the ex-cellence of your work in Utah, and in all sincerity, after having visited schools all over the country. I can say that I have not seen better work anywhere than you are doing."
