IN PRAISE OF STATE SCHOOL

Work Done at Deaf and Blind Institution Lauded by Eminent Educator.

FUNERAL OF J. M. EGGLESTON.

Impressive Services in Fifth Ward Meetinghouse—City Loses Damage Suit in District Court.

Ogden, Utah, March 20.—The excellency of the Utah State School for the Deaf and Blind which is known all over the United States, is indicated by the following extract from a letter received by Supr. F. M. Driggs from Prof. Thomas S. McAloney, formerly superintendent of the deaf and blind school at Boulder, Montana, but now one of the instructors in the Western Pennsylvania institution for the blind at Pittsburgh, who has visited the Utah school three times. "It has been my pleasure since coming east to testify a number of times concerning the excellence of your work in Utah, and in all sincerity, after having visited schools all over the country, I can say that I have not seen better work anywhere than you are doing."

Such praise from so able an educator of the deaf and blind as is Prof. McAloney, who has also had experience in Europe in teaching the blind, is very encouraging to Utah, and his able corps of teachers. The Utah school was first brought into great prominence at the world's fair at St. Louis when the class of pupils did such praiseworthy work, and again at the Lewis and Clark exposition at Portland in 1905, and today it ranks among the foremost institutions in America.

that was felt in Ogden over the untimely death of Joseph M. Eggleston last Thursday evening at Ely, Nevada, was evidenced yesterday by the large concourse of friends who assembled at the Fifth ward meetinghouse to sympathize with the grief-stricken family, and to pay a tribute of respect to his memory. The wealth of beautiful floral tributes silently bespoke the high esteem in which he was held in Ogden. Among the largest designs was one from the Ely Mercantile company, one from the Woodmen of the World, and one from the degree team.

The Woodmen of the World with Nichols band and the degree team marched to the family residence, where they held a short ritual. While the casket was being removed to the Fifth ward church, the band discoursed solemn music, also enroute to the Ogden City cemetery, where the body was laid to rest after the lodge ritual and the dedicatory prayer by Elder T. A. Shreve.

At the funeral services, which were presided over by Bishop John Watson, a ladies' quartet sang, "Home, Sweet Home," and "Sweet Rest in Heaven." Mrs. Alice Laughren sang "My Father's House," and Mrs. Mary Jones sang "Time We'll Understand," and Miss Tillie Hancock and Mrs. Polly Jones sang, "When the Mists Have Rolled Away." The exemplary life of the deceased was eulogized by Partharch W. Larkin, Judge J. A. Howell, Chief of Police T. E. Browning and Elder H. C. Jacobs. They expressed their feeling of his love for his mother, brothers and sister, and his true friendship. The loved ones were comforted in the hope of a glorious resurrection in the kingdom of heaven.

CITY LOSES DAMAGE SUIT.

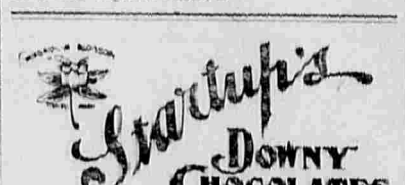
PARK CITY.
