We bid them welcome, and hope their stay will be an exceedingly pleasant one. Like the former party they think Utah is a beautiful region.

Fraternals.—Mr. J. W. Robbins, one of the regular staff, and at present travelling correspondent of the Chicago Inter-Ocean, made us a pleasant call this morning, accompanied by Mr. O. J. Hollister, of this city. The former will remain several days in our midst, with the intention of examining into the characteristics, doings and opinions of the Latter-day Saints and transmitting his views of the same for publication in the journal he represents. We bid him a hearty welcome, and trust he will have every opportunity of learning the real truth concerning the "Mormon" people and their system. This is all we ask. We court investigation, and are anxious to be known, not for what men say of us, but for what we truly are.

Returned Missionary.—Elder William W. Jackson, of American Fork, who left home on a mission to Europe December 2, 1879, returned home on Thursday evening, having been absent from Utah a little less than 18 months. He labored in England during this time, at first as travelling Elder in the Stafford District of the Birmingham Conference, on leaving which he was succeeded by Elder Wm. Turner. During their united labors, 30 souls were baptized in that district. He next went to the Nottingham Conference and labored in the Leicester and Derby Districts, but was not there long before he was appointed to take charge of the Southampton Conference. This position he held when released to come home. During his administration in Southampton, where his duties were rather arduous, he distributed a large number of tracts and baptized one person, a fine intelligent young man. Brother Jackson looks and feels well. He left for home this morning.

The Matinee.—The performance of the "Merchant of Venice" was well attended this afternoon. Another surprise was given to the audience in the impersonation of "Shylock," by Mr. Keene. His appearance was so changed from both of his previous performances, that for a few moments after coming upon the stage, he was absolutely unrecognizable. For this reason, he failed to receive the warm greeting which his appearance otherwise would have elicited. He was the crafty, spiteful Jew money-lender to perfection. One of his finest efforts was the address to Antonio, beginning with the words: "Signor Antonio, may I a time and oft, on the Rialto, etc." As he closed, the malignant sarcasm of the words "And for these courtesies, I lend you thus much money," was the quintessence of ironical malice. The support was excellent throughout, the characters of "Launcelot," "Gratiano," "Gobbo," and "Bassanio," "Portia," being especially noticeable. The members of the troupe are generally good actors and agreeable ladies and gentlemen.

Keene's "Hamlet."—The "Hamlet" of the tragedian Keene is a study. The Shakspearian student finds himself confronted by a rendering entirely new—one which furnishes him with food for reflection and surprises while it pleases his senses. The first thing presented is the fact, that it differs entirely from anything else bearing the same name. It is an original creation, and as in case of almost every innovation, the first emotion it inspires is not a happy one. We find that to accept the new we must give up the old, upon which our traditions and affections have been based for years, and concede that if the new idea be entirely correct, the old one, however delightful, must be necessarily obsolescent. It is this that makes Keene's "Hamlet" a study, and the cause of conflicting emotions. The character, in his hands, loses all of its antiquity. We listen to a modernized Shakspearian reading, to a "Hamlet" of to-day—a man of the 19th century in the garb of and surrounded by the circumstances of earlier times. One by one our preconceived notions are dispelled and blown to the winds, and we are made conscious of the fact that in this performance former things have passed away and all things have become new. But the excitement of new discovery is one of the cardinal pleasures of life, notwithstanding its effect upon the traditions of the past, and it fully serves to compensate us for their loss.

So that in the "Hamlet" of Mr. Keene we find plenty to please, as well as to astonish. It is certainly a remarkable conception, a most daring execution, for in order to live, it will, like other novel ideas, have to fight its way to the summit of popularity. This it can afford to do, and certainly will do, if, as we believe, it is a truthful conception; for if it deserves nothing better than the fall, it is sure to encounter. What ever may be said of its crudities it is certainly a strikingly natural interpretation. The unnatural antique polish, which other actors have given it, is entirely thrown away, and in lieu thereof we have a "Hamlet" we can look at and sympathize with, a being of flesh and blood like ourselves. Still a little more smoothness would not hurt Mr. Keene's rendition, but rather commend it to popular opinion. He is also entirely original in many of his interpretations of the text, and reads Shakspeare with such clearness, such marked attention to accent and gesture, that its maze and intricacies are made perfectly apparent to the poorest comprehension. The idea of assumed mental aberration, which it was doubtless the author's intention to portray, but for which so many actors seek to substitute actual insanity, was very clearly developed. Mr. Keene became quite hoarse toward the latter part of the play, doubtless the effects of his extraordinary exertions of the previous night, but his elocution was admirable nevertheless. The play went off with beautiful smoothness (Mr. Webb is behind the scenes) and although there was an economy in the use of scenery, the performance was truly enjoyable. The minor male characters were all well sustained, especially "Polonius," the "Queen," "Ghost" and "Laertes." Miss Tyler made a good "Ophelia," appearing to better advantage than on the previous night. To-night Mr. Keene appears in his greatest role, one for which he is peculiarly adapted—"King Richard the Third." Those who fail to attend will miss a grand treat.

Forged Check.—On Wednesday, the 4th inst., a man calling himself Williamson, entered the London Bank of Utah and presented a check for \$48.50, payable to James Williamson, and drawn by E. W. Hutchins, of Cheyenne, on Stebbins Post & Co., bankers of that city, expressed a desire to have it cashed. The teller declined to do this, but offered to take it for collection. Williamson accordingly left the check with the teller and went away. The manager of the Bank, Mr. Austin, immediately sent the check to the Cheyenne banking firm for collection.
