GLENDALE.

Four Feet of Snow in Kane County—Ten Feet in Mountains. Special Correspondence.

Glendale, Kane Co., Feb. 12.—It commenced snowing here on the morning of the 1st inst., and continued, moderately, with but little cessation, for nine days and nights. On the morning of the 10th the snow measured four feet two inches in this place. It cleared up the 10th and is now pleasant days but cold nights.

The prospect for the coming season, for the farmers, sheep and cattle men, is now good and they feel cheerful. There has not been any mail from the north since the second inst. until last night.

The mail carrier brought a small portion of the mail over the divide from Little's ranch on snowshoes. He reports the snow on the divide ten feet. More snow has fallen here in this one storm, than has ever fallen during any one storm since this place was settled in 1871. Your correspondent of the "News" of Jan. 31st, in the last we have received. We do not know what is going on in the world, nor what our law makers are doing in Salt Lake. Visit of Apostle Clawson—Will Remain in Tooele Stake.

Davis County Affairs—Various Apointments by Commissioners.

The petition of Geo. B. Garrett, and thirty-eight others, asking for the appointment of A. F. Stevenson as be inspector for Davis county was laid over until after the adjournment of the present Legislature.

Israel Barlow Jr., of West Bountiful, and Joseph E. Robinson, of Farmington, were appointed deputy assessors, upon the nomination of Assessor A. B. Cook, their compensation to be \$2.50 per day for time actually employed; provided the total compensation of assessor's deputies and assistants for the year 1901 shall not exceed \$250.

The resignation of A. C. Brown as justice of the peace for South Precinct, was accepted and Chas. E. Pearson was appointed to fill the vacancy thus created.

Dr. Brant Stringham was appointed health officer for district No. 1, to fill an existing vacancy. Daniel C. Lee of West Bountiful having formerly acted as such. This district includes all of Davis county south of the north line of Farmington precinct.
