This work is adapted to the comprehension of children, is well suited for class or self-instruction, and is the best educational text book of botany that we have seen.

**AN OLD FRIEND WITH A NEW NAME.**—Who, of all the thousands of denizens of the mountains and wanderers over the plains, would recognize the familiar, beautiful and fragrant sage brush by the following scientific description?

"*Artemisia tridentata*, Nutt. Shrubby, 1-6' high, much branched, branches spreading; leaves crowded, obovate, 6-12' long, usually 3-toothed at the apex, the teeth short and obtuse; those of the dense compound leaf pinnate linear and entire; all finely tomentose-canescens like the branches; heads obovoid, 5-6 flowered; outer involucre scales tomentose, very short; inner ones longer, scarious; florets all perfect and fertile; corolla funnel-form, 5-toothed, the proper tube very short; styles 2-3, the branches widened slightly upward, truncate and somewhat pinnatifid."

CONGRESSIONAL.

**SENATE.**  
WASHINGTON, 5.—A bill moved to reduce the appropriation for the Union Pacific Railroad from \$500,000 to \$250,000.

**SENATE.**  
Schuyler introduced a bill in reference to freight and passengers by the Union Pacific Railroad and branches. The bill sets forth the provisions of the acts of 1862 and 1864, that the Union Pacific Railroad company, and its branches, chartered at the same time should be operated as one continuous and connected line, and that they should not discriminate against each other as to time or rates of in any way. It then states that the branch roads complain that they are discriminated against in violation of law; and provides a remedy that either of the companies, or companies, may begin suit, either at law or in equity, in any Circuit court of the U. S. or territorial court having jurisdiction, and on final hearing the court may make judgment for all damages to be paid by the company, or companies, by acquiescence or execution and sale of the road and franchises, and if necessary may cause forfeiture of the charter of the offending company.

The bill also provides that in all cases where the Union Pacific Railroad and branches or any of them cannot agree on rates for transportation of freight and passengers, either company may notify the secretary of the interior of the fact, and he shall thereupon give notice to the other company, or companies, and at an appointed time fix a schedule of rates which shall be adopted by the companies, and if either of them refuse to abide the decision he may cause the road, etc., to be sold, or sold on such terms as he may prescribe, a report the facts to the President of the United States, to be transmitted to Congress for action, or may be deemed proper.

## EASTERN DISPATCHES.

**WASHINGTON, 5.**—The following resolution was passed by the National Telegraph Morse Memorial Association this a. m.:

"Whereas the U. S. House of Representatives has placed its hall at the disposal of this Association for the purpose of holding a memorial to Congress on the late Samuel F. B. Morse, on Tuesday, April 16, and prominent members of both houses of Congress have consented to address the meeting; and

"Whereas the telegraph wires have been freely placed at the disposal of this association for that evening; therefore

"Resolved, that the municipal authorities of the cities and towns of the U. S. be hereby invited to hold meetings of a similar character in their several localities on the same evening in order that the meetings may be in telegraphic communication and thus simultaneous expression be given to the national grief on the occasion of this irreparable loss."

The President has signed the Chicago Relief Bill.

**NEW YORK.**—A. Fisk, jun., monumental fund and memorial concert are under way.

The bank statement shows a decrease of a million six hundred and twenty thousand in specie.

A prisoner before Judge James' court at Williamsburg to-day, being found to have the smallpox, the judge and all the officers of the court seemed to think there was no evidence in the case to justify the holding of the prisoner for any great length of time, and he left the court room. The prisoner walked calmly away.

**WESTERN DISPATCHES.**  
LOS ANGELES, 5.—Passengers just arrived report destitution at Lone Pine among the people in that section. It has been raining and snowing since the first shock. The people suffer from gold. The loss to the entire valley is \$200,000. Lumber is scarce and the people will not build till they can put up frame buildings. The lake two miles south of Lone Pine has sunk some six feet and a third of the bed is dry. None of the mines have been thrown down. There have been no contributions of money or clothing supplies by the people of this place, which for a long time has been the centre from which supplies were sent and received from the mines in the Owens River country.
