Happy Wedding Bells-Home From Netherlands Mission-Suit For Divorce.

The suit brought by Mrs. Sarah J. Brown against Bernard G. Knoth for the ejectment of defendant from the plaintiffs' building, situated on the corner of Twenty-fifth street and Washington avenue, occupied by Mr. Knoth with his drug business, was completed last evening before Judge Rolapp and a jury. The case was submitted to the jurors about 4 o'clock, who, after being out nearly four hours, returned to the court room stating that they could not agree. four being for the plaintiff and the other half for no cause of action.

The plaintiff set up as her cause of action that Mr. Knoth had been occupying the premises on a lease, but that it expired Aug. 31, 1903, that at that time a verbal lease was made between the parties, whereby Mr. Knoth was to rent the place from month to month, and Sept. 3, 1903 another verbal lease was entered into for two years. Nov. 11, Mrs. Brown gave him notice to vacate the premises by Dec. 1, which he refused to do, claiming that he was under verbal lease and would not leave until the time was up. The jury having disagreed, Mrs.

Brown will have to bring another suit against Mr. Knoth, and in the meantime he will occupy the place, unless he decides of his own accord to move out. The corner occupied by Mr, Kroth is considered the best corner in na city for the drug business, hence his reluctancy to vacate.

Some facts about Colombia which have come by way of Washington are in point just now. Colombia, not counting Panama, is as large as California and Texas combined, and has over 10 times the population of Panama; an estimate made in 1881 puts the figures at 3,500,000, exclusive of the people of Panama. Bogota, its capital, has been called "the Athens of South America." Its population is 125,000; the national university is located there, and the city has an excellent library of 50,000 volumes, a picture-gallery, an observatory, and a number of learned institutions. Twelve days are required to get from the coast to the capital. One lands at Barranquilla, at the mouth of the Magdalena river, goes up the river steamer to Honda-5921/2 miles from the coast, then by rall for 22 miles to La Dora, by mule journey for 45 miles to Facatativa, and from there by rail again to Bogota, 24 miles .- Harper's Weekly.
