Denver, Colo., Aug. 14 .- The National Building Trades Council convention today after a spirited debate endorsed

Congressman-elect William Randolph Hearst of New York for the presidency of the United States by a vote of 28 to Resolutions were adopted committing

CHIEF JUSTICE LOREE DISCUSSES MOB SPIRIT Chautauqua, N. Y., Aug. 14 .- The discussion of mob law and lynching was continued here today by Chief Justice

Loree, of Delaware. His subject was "The Relation of the Law to the Manifestation of the Mob Spirit. Justice Loree, summarizing the ef-fect of mob law by its brutaijzed individual man and increased crime, said: "What is the remedy? What is the cure for mobs? Most emphatically we say the remedy is not in hasty and feverish action of courts of justice

against the criminal whose offense is the exciting cause. "Law has its highest function in

throwing its shield of protection be-fore the ignorant, the weak and the helpless and was especially designed as a barrier against temporary madness. The more brutal the crime, the more degraded and ignorant the criminal, the

more widespread and tense the public rage, the more imperative it is that courts of justice should secure calm and just hearing and that the guilt of the accused be established; otherwise innocent men may be punished for crimes they did not commit; as in a recent lynching of a negro in the south

where it was found after his death that he had not been within 20 miles of the "When mob spirit rules, courts of justice should be unyielding in their stand for fair dealing, otherwise they

simply become the mob and executers of vengeance and not of justice. "The judges of Delaware have no apology to make for not listening to

suggestions of mob vengeance in the case of George White, "One cure for mob law unquestion-ably is the fearless defense of the accused by his keeper. "Outside of violence, the remedy, in my judgment, is that the people shall be taught in season and out of season

that our safety as a people lies in im-plicit obedience to the law. This should be taught in our public schools; by the press; by the pulpit and on the "Anarchy lurks under the pleading tarb

arb of liberty and the assassin lothes himself as a defender of human rights. Lawlessness is our dange. Reverence of the law and obedience to her mandates is our safety. A strong masterful sentiment of such obedience to law is a sure cure for mobs.

"I believe with United States Judg David Brewer, That there is going t be a reaction against the atrocious crime with which the papers have been filed.' The fact that the people are nov interesting themselves in the discussion

of the problem makes it manifest there is a tendency toward a change. I expect it will come soon."
