BY TELEGRAPH. AMERICAN. LATEST DISPATCHES. Guiteau's Trial Continued. WASHINGTON, 24.—Col. Reed, Scoville, and J. W. Guiteau were in consultation half an hour and deferred the opening of the court.

MORE CAMPBELL TRICKERY. This New York Herald's Washington correspondent furnishes his paper with a list of all the anti-Mormon bills which have been introduced into Congress during the last twenty years, and all of which have perished in their turn.

It is plain, from a part of the correspondence, that the Herald correspondent has been misled in relation to the woman suffrage act passed in Utah in 1870. He refers to it as "perhaps an extraordinary enactment as was ever placed on the statute books of a Territory or State."

It is enacted, etc., that every woman of twenty-one years who has resided in this Territory six months next preceding any general election in the United States, or who is the wife, widow or the daughter of a native born or naturalized citizen of the United States, shall be entitled to vote at any election in this Territory.
