AMERICAN.

ALABAMA.

COLUMBUS, 5.—In the Third Alabama district, Sanford, dem., is elected without serious opposition. Forney, dem., has been re-elected in the Seventh, and Lowe, independent, in the Eighth Alabama districts.

Montgomery, 5.—Indications are that the democratic nominees will be elected except, possibly in the Eighth district, where the contest is very close between Garth, dem., and Lowe, ind.

ARKANSAS.

Little Rock, 5.—The falling off in the vote of this city is nearly 1,000 since the election two months ago. Rice, greenbacker, has 507 majority in this county. The general impression is that Cravers, dem., is elected in this, the Third district, but by a greatly reduced majority. The democrats are confident of the election of the democratic candidates in other districts.

CONNECTICUT.

Hartford, Conn., 5.—Returns from 148 towns give Andrews 45,355; Hubbar, 43,911; Atwater, 7,696; Baldwin, 1,055. The republicans elect Hawley, Wait and Miles to Congress. The republicans will have the legislature by thirty-five majority, and as there is no election by the people the republican ticket will be elected by the legislature.

DELAWARE.

Wilmington, 5.—Complete returns of this city, give Waddell, dem., for Congress 1,001; Russell, greenback, 1,924.

John W. Hall, dem., has been elected governor; Edward Martin, dem., elected to Congress. The republicans ran no candidate for either of the above offices.

FLORIDA.

Savannah, 5.—Specials from Florida, indicate the election of Hull and Davidson, dems., to Congress.

Jacksonville, 5.—Duval County, the largest in the district, gives a large majority for Bisbee, rep., for Congress, but it is believed Hull, dem., will be elected. In Madison County, at sun down, when the polls should have closed, 400 people had not voted and voting was still going on at last accounts.

GEORGIA.

Macon, 5.—Blount is unanimously re-elected from the Sixth Congressional district where there was no opposition, and the vote is light.

Augustus, 5.—The vote in the Eighth district is light. Alex. H. Stephens is re-elected to Congress without opposition. Returns from Congressional districts come in slowly. Following is probably the result in the State: First district, Nicholls; Second, Smith; Third, Cook; Fourth, Harris; Fifth, Hammond; Sixth, Blount; Seventh, Felton; Eighth, Stephens; Ninth, Billups. The official count may change this in the Seventh and Ninth districts.

Columbus, Ga., 5.—Returns indicate that Persons, dem., is elected to Congress over Harris, the present member, by from 500 to 1,000 majority, both democrats. Persons is inclined to be a greenbacker.

ILLINOIS.

Chicago, 5.—Midnight.—Returns from the Congressional districts of this State, although incomplete, seem to show that the republicans have gained two representatives, namely, Davis in the Second district and Thomas in the Eighteenth district. If these figures hold good the Congressional delegation from Illinois in the next Congress will stand: Republicans, 13; democrats, 6. Thomas and Davis replace Hartzell and Harrison, present members. One hundred and eighty towns in the State give Smith 23,953; Cronkite, 13,238; Bates, 5,637. No indications yet as to the legislature, except that it will be very close, with the probabilities of a few republican gains, and a republican senator to succeed Governor Oglesby.

The straight republican county Congressional tickets is elected here by unusual majorities.

IOWA.

Davenport, 5.—Hiram Price, republican, was again re-elected today, many democrats voting for him. He was returned in the October election, but for precaution it was deemed wise to vote for him

again. His majority this time is 5,000.

KENTUCKY.

Louisville, 5.—In the Louisville district, Albert S. Willis was re-elected over John Watts Kearney, dem., and Horace Scott, rep., by a small majority. In all the other districts the democrats will be returned, unless it is in the Eighth, where the result is doubtful.

LOUISIANA.

New Orleans, 5.—The election in the city and throughout the State as far as known, passed off quietly. The majority of A. E. Burke for State treasurer in New Orleans is estimated at 18,000. His majority in the State, it is believed, will exceed 30,000. Returns, as far as received, indicate the election of congressmen as follows: First district, Gibson, dem., second district, Ellis, dem., third district, Acklin, dem., fourth district, Elam, sixth district, Robertson, dem. It is impossible to make a close estimate of the result, but the following is given as the approximation. Democratic conservative ticket, 14,000; citizen's conservative, 10,000; nationals, 5,000; tax payer's 1,000.

The nationals and republicans claim the election of Herbert for congress in the Third district over Acklin.

MARYLAND.

Baltimore, 5.—Full returns from the Third congressional district, this city, gives Kemmell, democrat, 11,472; Thomson, greenback and republican, 4,800. The full return from the Fourth congressional district, composed of other wards of the city, excepting the 17th, which is included in the Fifth district, give McLane, democrat, 11,064; Holland, republican, 6,671; Quigley, greenback, 628; Gillings, independent democrat, 398. McLane's majority over Holland, 4,343, over all, 3,311.

The democratic majorities range on congressional nominations, from 1,500 to 4,000, but in the Sixth district, Urner, republican, is believed to be elected.

MASSACHUSETTS.

Boston, 5.—At 9 p.m. Talbot's election by 30,000 plurality is conceded by Butler's friends. All republican representatives to congress from the eleven districts, with the exception of the Fourth, where Brimmer is defeated by Morse, democrat, are undoubtedly elected so far as the present returns indicate.

All republican candidates for state offices are elected.

MICHIGAN.

Detroit, 5.—In every district, so far as heard from, the republicans are ahead in the congressional race, having a plurality in all, but hardly a clear majority in any district. These figures, if they hold out, will make a republican gain of one. Pluralities range from 50 to 1,700.

MINNESOTA.

St. Paul, 5.—The election proceeded quietly, but with a full vote in the city.

The contest is very close in the second district between Washburne, rep., and Donnelly, dem. and greenbacker.

Minneapolis, 5.—Republicans, at last accounts, estimate Washburne, rep., has 3,500 majority in this district.

MISSOURI.

St. Louis, 5.—Partial returns of the city indicate that something more than half of the republican ticket is elected.

There seems to be no doubt of the election of Frost, dem., in the third district. Cole, rep., is so close to Wells, dem., that the republicans are claiming his election. If Wells carries the second district, the democrats will gain three congressmen from this city.

NEVADA.

San Francisco, 5.—Dispatches from Virginia City say the democratic legislative ticket is ahead in the State. There is much scratching. Democrats charge the extensive use of money on the part of republicans.

NEW HAMPSHIRE.

Concord, 5.—Returns from 150 towns indicate the election of Head for governor by 1,000 majority. As returned, the House stands, 89 republicans, 66 democrats and 6 greenbackers. The republicans claim they have from 25 to 35 majority. The republicans have doubtless carried the 14 senatorial districts, and

the democrats eight, with two doubtful.

NEW JERSEY.

Trenton, 5.—The republicans probably elect five of the seven congressmen and a majority of the assembly. Robeson, Pugh, Voorhees, and Blake, republicans, are certainly elected. Brigham, republican, is probably elected. This is a democratic loss of two.

NEW YORK.

New York, 5.—Three hundred and eighty-five election districts of this city give a majority of 14,000 for Cooper for mayor. The entire anti-Tammany republican combination ticket for city officers is elected. Kelly has just made a speech in Tammany Hall, saying, "We are beaten all along the line." The Tribune furnishes the following figures: The republican majority in the Senate will be 8, and the republican majority in the assembly is estimated at 50. It is estimated that the republican majority on the joint ballot will be 53. The last assembly stood; Republican, 65; democrats, 60; independent, 1; greenback, 1; workingmen, 1.

NORTH CAROLINA.

Raleigh, 5.—Davis, democrat, carries the fourth district by 1,800 majority. It is estimated that the second district is close, the chances favoring Kitchen, democrat. In the third district, Waddell's, democrat, the majority is estimated at 500. In the fifth district, Hales, democrat wins by a majority of 2,000. In the sixth, seventh and eighth districts the democrats have certainly elected. No opposition.

PENNSYLVANIA.

Philadelphia, 5.—In this city 26 wards out of the 81 show a republican gain of 8,166 and a majority of 15,066. In the first congressional district H. H. Bingham, rep., is elected. In the second district, Charles O'Neill, rep., is elected by 4,929 majority; in the third district, Samuel J. Randall, dem., has about 1,900 majority; in the fourth district, Wm. D. Kelly, rep., has 6,221 majority, and in the fifth district, A. C. Harmer, rep., is elected by a majority of 4,542.

Reading, Pa., 5.—In the eighth district Heister Clymer, dem., is re-elected by over 5,000 majority.

Wilkesbarre, Pa., 5.—In the twelfth district Hendrick B. Wright is undoubtedly re-elected to Congress.

RHODE ISLAND.

Providence, R. I., 5.—The Journal has returns from the entire state except Block Island. In the first district Nelson W. Aldrich, rep., has 5,910; Davis, dem., 1,324; Sayles, greenback, 606; scattering, 104. Aldrich's majority, 3,586; Barnaby, dem., 4,535; Smith, greenback, 311; scattering, none. Ballou's majority, 708.

SOUTH CAROLINA.

Charleston, 5.—Returns from all portions of the State show heavy democratic gains. Governor Hampton and the present state officers are re-elected without opposition. Aiken and Evans, dem., are re-elected to Congress from the third and fourth districts with scarcely any opposition. Tillman, dem., is claimed to have beaten Smalls, colored republican, by nearly 8,000 majority. In Charleston the democratic majority is estimated at from 4,000 to 5,000, but the republican strongholds, the sea island precincts, cannot be heard from until tomorrow. The election was quiet throughout the State, and entirely without disturbance of any kind.

TENNESSEE.

Memphis, 5.—Casey Young, ind. dem., carries the city by 600 over Randolph, rep., and Kellar, greenback. Young is doubtless elected. Knoxville, 5.—Midnight returns show that Taylor, dem., of the first district, is elected over Pettibone, rep., and Houk, rep., over Watkins, ind., in the second district.

Nashville, 5.—The election is quiet all over the State and the vote unprecedentedly light. The entire democratic ticket of this county is elected. The greenbackers received a majority of the colored vote in the county. House, Bright, Dibrell and Atkins are re-elected to Congress. In the Ninth congressional district Simonton, dem., is elected. Huck, rep., is elected in the second district, and in the first district the republicans concede the election of P. L. Taylor, dem., over Pettibone, rep. In the fourth dis-

trict McMillen, dem., is probably elected over Gilliday, ind. In the seventh district the vote is close between Whitethorne and Moore, both democrats. The returns indicate the re-election of Whitethorne. The legislature is very largely democratic. Marks, dem., nominee for governor, has a majority over both the greenback and republican candidates.

TEXAS.

Galveston, 5.—Returns are meagre, but they indicate the election of the democratic State ticket by about the usual majority. No returns from Schleicher, Hancock district, but all the other democrats are elected.

VERMONT.

St. Albans, Vt., 5.—The special congressional election in the Third District, ordered by the governor; there being no election in September, took place to-day. Returns from 48 towns give Bradley Barlow, bolting republican and greenback, 7,141; W. W. Grout, regular republican, 4,161; G. L. Waterman, democrat, 806; Barlow's majority is 3,174; the plurality over Grout, 3,980; the gain over Grout since September, 1,338. Twenty-eight towns to hear from but Barlow's victory is assured.

VIRGINIA.

Richmond, 5.—The election is quiet. The vote is small, only about 3,000 polled out of a registered vote of over 13,000.

Norfolk, 5.—The election is quiet. The vote is small. The indications are that Goode is re-elected to Congress by 10,000 majority.

Alexandria, 5.—The election here is very quiet. No interest is manifested and the vote is not half out. Hutton, for Congress, had no organized opposition. His majority here is 370. Carter, greenbacker, received but 214 votes and Cochran, republican, but 3.

Returns indicate that Johnston's majority will be 1,600 to 1,800. Meagre returns from the first district indicate the election of R. E. T. Beale, conservative, over Critcher, independent. In the second district, the cities of Norfolk and Portsmouth, and Norfolk County give Democrat, republican, about 150 majority over Goode, conservative, but returns from other points indicate Goode's election by a fair majority. Returns from the fourth district are too meagre on which to base calculations. The contest is between Jorgensen, rep., and W. E. Hinton, with the chances in favor of Jorgensen. The fifth district re-elects George C. Cabell, conservative. In the sixth district, J. Randolph Tucker is elected. There is an exciting contest in the seventh district between John T. Harris and John Paul, forcible re-adjuster of the State debt. Returns from over half the district favor Harris' election. General Eppa Hutton was re-elected in the eighth district, without opposition. There is nothing definite from the ninth district, where there are four candidates.

Petersburg, 5.—Returns from the fourth district indicate the re-election of Jorgensen, rep., to Congress.

WISCONSIN.

Milwaukee, 5, 1.45 a.m.—Returns up to this hour indicate the following result on Congressmen: First district, Williams, rep., is re-elected by a slightly increased majority; second district, Caswell, rep., is re-elected by an increased majority; the third and fourth districts are in doubt; in the fifth district, Bragg, dem., is re-elected by a diminished majority; in the sixth district, Bouck, dem., is re-elected by an increased majority; in the seventh district, Humphrey, rep., is re-elected; in the eighth, Pound, rep., is re-elected by an increased majority. The republicans gain 12 assemblymen and two senators and will have a good majority on the joint ballot. Milwaukee county elects the entire republican ticket for the first time.

SAN FRANCISCO, 5.—A Portland dispatch says: A fight occurred between about 20 whites and 60 Chinese operatives in the woolen mills at Oregon City. The former were the aggressors. Several were severely hurt on both sides, and one Chinaman probably fatally shot. The authorities finally quelled the disturbance, but fears are entertained of an early renewal of hostilities.

CHICAGO, 6.—The returns from Illinois, as far as heard from, give Smith, republican, for state treas-

urer, 54,498; Cronkite, democrat, 31,502; Bates, greenbacker, 14,737.

Detroit, 6, noon.—From present indications the republicans have elected the entire congressional delegation from the state, which is a gain of one congressman in the first district; Newbury, republican, being elected in the district by a plurality of 1,023. The legislature will be strongly republican. Four hundred and fifty towns and precincts heard from give Crosswell a plurality of 24,005.

St. Louis, 6.—The democratic state ticket received an average plurality of 2,700. In the second congressional district Wells, democrat, has a plurality over Cole, republican, the present incumbent, of about 1,700. In the third district Frost, democrat, has a plurality over Metcalf, republican, the present incumbent, of about 1,500.

Returns from the 13th Congressional district, make it pretty certain that Tipton, the republican is defeated by Stevenson, greenbacker and democrat, by over 500 majority. There is nothing definite from the 18th district yet, but both parties claim it. Indications are that the republicans have a fair working in the State legislature, though the democrats do not concede it.

Philadelphia, 6.—The total vote of the city gives Hoyt, rep., 69,940; Dill, dem., 53,351; Mason, national, 3,158; Lane, prohibitionist, 146. State legislature will be republican by about the same majority as the last legislature. The probabilities are that the congressional delegation will stand unchanged—17 republicans and 10 democrats.

Savannah, Ga., 6.—Nichols' majority in the 1st congressional district is estimated at 3,500.

Jacksonville, Fla., 6.—Hull, democrat, is certainly elected in this district and Davison, democrat, in the 1st congressional district. The legislature is democratic in both branches.

Boston, 6.—The result of yesterday's vote for governor, in 336 towns, foots up, Talbot 134,108; Butler, 108,321; Abbot, 9,803; Miner, 1,967; Talbot carries every district in the State by a handsome majority except two Boston districts. Eight towns to hear from will carry Talbot's plurality up to 26,000 over Butler. The result in the 6th congressional district is still in doubt.

TRENTON, 6.—The legislature stands—Senate, 11 republicans, 10 democrats; one of the latter is independent; House, 36 republicans, 24 democrats. Smith, democrat and greenbacker, is elected to Congress in the second district by 1,000 majority. Amos Clark, republican, is probably elected in the third district by 250 majority.

FOREIGN.

LONDON, 5.—In the mills, at Wigan, 1,070 looms and 94,600 spindles are stopped, and 2,500 looms, and 310,000 spindles are running on short time.

Thomas Ahern, the last of the English Fenian prisoners, has been released.

It is stated that the inhabitants of Kohistan have rebelled and murdered the governor. The Ameer sent a large force to restore order.

PETERSBURG, 5.—It is officially denied that Russian officials are participating in or encouraging the Bulgarian insurrection. General Todleben has issued fresh orders to the Russian commanders on the East Roumelian frontier to prevent the organization of insurgent bands and to watch the movements of insurgent committees.

The imperial yacht Levadi left Levadia on the 2nd inst., for Odessa, with the Grand Duke Sergin, son of the Czar, and suite. The yacht was swamped during fogs and a heavy gale, but all on board were safely landed. The yacht was afterwards thrown on the rocks, and will probably go to pieces.

CONSTANTINOPLE, 5.—The Russians have arrested 500 Bulgarians who were about to enter Macedonia.

PANAMA, Oct. 26.—The Star and Herald publishes a long account of an earthquake in Salvador on the evening of Oct. 6. In Jucupao nearly every house was destroyed and many families buried in the ruins. At the latest advices ten bodies were recovered and many persons still missing. Nueva, Guadalupe, Santiago de Maria, and Chinameca are destroyed, and the loss of life is serious in each place. Other towns which suffered by the earthquake are Guadalupe, Usulutana, Caserijodel and Arenal. An
