

BRYAN FRIENDS OPPOSE JOHNSON

They Are Determined That He Shall Not Be Nebraskan's Running Mate.

JUDGE GRAY IS ACCEPTABLE

Chicago, July 1.—The federal grand jury returned, in Judge Landis' court yesterday, 50 indictments against Chi-
