A NEEDED AMENDMENT.

All the voting done in New York on Tuesday last was not for Presidential electors or state officers by any means. A consequential feature of the following was the determination by such means whether or not the constitution of the commonwealth should be amended, so it was in California and we believe also in two other states. In the first named the amendment would be to amend the constitution so as to make it more perfect, and it would be a good thing if it could be made universal because, as it seems, some method for determining contested election cases other than by more participation is one of the crying needs of the times. The text of the amendment is as follows:

The election returns and qualifications of every member of either house of the legislature when disputed or contested shall be determined by the courts in such manner as the legislature shall prescribe, and such determination, when made, shall be conclusive upon the legislature. Every person who contests a certificate of election as a member of either house of the legislature shall be liable to a fine of \$100, and to imprisonment for six months, or to both, at the discretion of the court.

This is declared to be a consequence of the late struggle over contested election cases in the New York legislature and in some cases reached the courts after the members of that body had acted upon it, each of course in accordance with his political predilection, whether his was right or wrong. The circumstances of the case of the justice of the situation are, it is not for us to say, partly because we don't know and partly because it is not material; the justice of the case is, as we said, ought to be established.
