FROM THE SOUTH.—A letter from Bro. Ellis M. Sanders, dated St. George, 14th inst., says, "I have been cutting wheat nearly all the past week in Heberville. The wheat there is better than I ever saw it, although it has not been irrigated and has had no water except that which has fallen from the heavens, for we have had no rain, neither do I think there ever will be, the half of Heberville being washed away and continuing to wash away, as the river is very high. The Santa Clara is also very high and hardly safe to cross. The water has been in the Clara ditch for some time, yet I believe the wheat is as good in Heberville as in the Clara field. There is more wheat in this section of country than we ever had before. On the mornings of the first and second of June the frost was heavy enough to kill the corn and sun-flowers in the Clara field, and although it has been warm for the past week in the day time, the mornings have been cold. The wind has been very high to-day, and to-night is cold enough for frost if the wind should fall."

LATIMER & TAYLOR published a card in yesterday's News, stating that in the fire which destroyed their property and machinery the books of the firm were burned; and calling upon those whom they had accounts against to meet that indebtedness, or at least to send a statement and acknowledgement of it to them. We hope there is no one in the Territory who will hesitate a moment to do so; and that every one who can, will promptly pay them what is due them. We understand a very general feeling has been manifested to assist them to replace their machinery, either by donation or loan. This is highly laudable, and we would like to see some steps taken in the matter immediately, and not let it end in merely an expression of feeling concerning their loss. We have received a communication on the matter which we will have to withhold until to-morrow.

CACHE CO.—We had a call yesterday from Bishop Wm. Maughan and Elders Gunnell and Parkinson, from Wellsville, and Bishop Budge from Providence. They reported general good health and excellent feelings prevailing in those settlements; and the prospect of an abundant harvest throughout the county. Wellsville, which suffered so much last year from the locusts, has the prospect this year of the heaviest crop they have ever gathered there.

FROM MENDON.—Br. Alfred Gardner, writing from Mendon, Cache county, informs us that there the grain looks exceedingly well, and the people have good hopes of an abundant harvest. A Female Relief Society has been organized, and the sisters are energetically attending to the duties connected with it. The Sunday School is doing well; and all things are progressing in that settlement.

LOGAN.—Bro. George L. Farrell, writing from Logan, says: "Our emigration teams—21 mule and 35 ox teams—have all left the valley in good order. It was by far the best outfit we have ever sent from this valley for the gathering of the poor. Our crops look excellent. Fall wheat is heading out and some is in the blossom. Fall rye, also, looks splendid. Corn and vegetables look very well. In fact the people expect the most abundant harvest ever gathered in this valley. Our benches and bottoms are one vast area of grain, which will be a welcome sight for the great numbers of Saints that will gather up the present season. Some three or four companies have left here to go to work on the railroad; and others are talking of leaving soon."

SANTAQUIN.—From Santaquin Bro. D. H. Holladay writes that the wheat in that settlement has suffered severely from the ravages of the grasshoppers. There are not more than ten acres of wheat left standing. The brethren planted corn, but that has been eaten down also; and many of them have gone to work on the railroad. The prospects are not very flattering for harvest, though Bro. Holladay expects that good corn crops can yet be raised. The locusts were leaving them and dying by millions, a circumstance which the people were not regretting much.

FROM MONDAY'S DAILY.

SABBATH MEETINGS.—The morning meeting was addressed by Elders George Q. Cannon and Jonathan Pugmire, and by Bishop E. D. Woolley.

In the afternoon Elder Joseph F. Smith delivered a discourse upon the advantages enjoyed by the Saints in being guided by a living, inspired priesthood, and exhorted them to honor their callings by observing the counsels imparted unto them.

TO MILL CREEK.—Yesterday Local accompanied Edward Stevenson on a visit to Mill Creek Ward, which is not a region of mills as might be expected from the name, nor yet given over to vague Millerite theories, although the people are strong believers in Miller, but it is their worthy Bishop, of that name, who holds their feelings, belief and affections. The first question that arose on the way was, What are the locusts doing? For their ravages were very severe in that locality a few weeks ago. The "winged hosts" have in a great measure departed, and where they have cleared the ground there is a chance yet for planting and obtaining a crop of corn and potatoes. The early sown wheat and planted crops seem to have stood best and promise to give a greater yield than those which were put in later. Some wheat and barley looked very beautiful; and the indications for the pea and potato crops are most promising, as far as we saw. Indeed we can speak personally of the quality of both these edibles, as grown by Bro. David Grant, who kindly acted the part of host to us. Up to the bench, we understood, most damage had been done, still there are hopes now of harvesting more than it was believed at one time would be done this year. Before meeting we dropped into the Sunday school, which is prospering, over a hundred and fifty scholars being present, with sixteen teachers and two superintendents. The young people seemed much interested in their studies. The meeting held afterwards was well attended and spirited.

There is a good show for plenty of fish being obtained in that quarter after a time, for Bro. J. Hill has a pond made, with the water in it, covering nearly three acres of ground; and Bro. David Grant designs making one, in an excellent and natural location for it, which will cover about two acres.

Superintendent R. L. Campbell, who visited Bishop Brinton's Ward yesterday, informs us that the crops have suffered severely there, but that there are prospects of harvesting a fair product of some crops, potatoes especially.

OUT GOING TRAINS.—By letter from Captain Joseph S. Rawlins to Bishop Hunter, we learn that he was at La Cede Station on the 24th, about 250 miles east of this city, with thirty one wagons going for immigrants and two independent wagons, all well. The teams are doing first rate.

Captain J. R. Murdoch telegraphed to President Young this morning that he was at Point of Rocks with his train, all well.
