HAS CHAMPIONSHIP CLAIM.

So Says "Billy" Madden Who is Here As His Manager—Schreck Looks Good to Him.

Gas Ruhlín, the giant prize fighter, known as the "Akron Giant," came to town this morning over the Salt Lake route from Los Angeles.

How he figured it out that way he did not explain. Madden was much more frank, however. He said: "Schreck, looks good to me. My opinion is that he is a champion. I think he has got championship stuff in him. They say he is not big enough. But he weighs 175 pounds or better. The big men don't always win. In fact, there have been but two really heavy-weight champions in 50 years. They were Sullivan and Jeffries. Of course, they don't take Ruhlín in to this computation but we are here to pit him against the best man in tomorrow's world. I think he can win from him."

In my judgment the real championship of the world, today, lies between Ruhlín and Hart. Ruhlín's defeat of Jim McCormick in San Francisco last month settled that. You saw Hart in a fight with a draw with Jeffries though he was later beaten by the champion. He also put Sharkey to the bed in his two last battles with him. If I get a fight for Ruhlín out of the winter of the contest in Salt Lake tomorrow night, and you witness in that clash as I expect we will be then Hart will have to meet Ruhlín for the real championship. And that is what we are here for and that is what we expect to see."

Madden is one of the best pasted of the lifetime sporting authorities in the United States, and has at various times managed more than 20 championships, including John L. Sullivan, Mitchell, Dempsey and Kilrain.
