Not only did little Jodey pitch a great game, but his support was almost faultless. Big Chief Borchers was there as usual allowing but six well scattered hits, but for once he had the pleasure of knowing the feeling of defeat.

In the second inning Ancient Buck Weaver started the "Frisco" laid by bumping one of his famous shots way out into the garden while he gambled around the bases. At another time Ogden had the socks occupied with two gone when Mr. Casey drove a swift one into Stoney's hands. A feature of the play was a right handed catch by Jodey.
