

## BRIEF TELEGRAMS.

A memorial service, in honor of Gen. W. S. Hancock, was held at Governor's Island last night, under the auspices of the military service of the institution.

General Hazen, chief signal service officer, is now suing George Jones, proprietor of the New York Times, to recover \$100,000 damages for an alleged libel, it being charged that that newspaper published libelous statements concerning the plaintiff's character as signal service officer and also concerning his connection with the recent arctic expedition.

A Lewiston, Maine, dispatch says: Moses Crafts & Co. and Dengeley, Strout & Co., shoe manufacturers of Auburn, have followed the example of Asa Cushman & Co., by entering into an agreement with the Knights of Labor, which shall govern their relations with their employees. Other firms will probably follow.

A committee of the Hungarian Diet has given its approval to the bill for the suppression of Socialism. Under the provisions of this measure summary dealings with all Socialists are authorized and severe punishment will be visited upon any person having letters in his possession declaring Socialistic tendencies or on anyone providing rooms for the meetings of the Socialists.

A Madrid dispatch says: A sensation has been caused here by the discovery of a conspiracy to affect the stock market for speculative purposes. Bogus telegrams were sent to the principal stock brokers at Barcelona reporting fictitious quotations at Madrid and ordering large sales. The result was that the markets were badly disturbed. The authors of the telegrams have not been found. The government is investigating the matter. It is feared that a similar trick has been played elsewhere in Spain.
