

SHERIFF RICKER'S SLAYER.

Was Captured at Billings, Mont., and Admits His Crime.

Made a Desperate Fight and Begged To be Given a Chance to Run, Even if Shot.

Billings, Mont., Jan. 27.-Charles Woodard, who admits that he is the nurderer of Sheriff Ricker of Casper, Wyo., was captured this afternoon at 1 o'clock at the ranch of Wilson Owens, thirteen miles west of Billings, and brought to this city for safe keeping. Woodard's capture was effected by Owens, together with his hired man-John Berkheimer, but not without a desperate battle.

Woodard came to the Owens ranch Bill Gad, and saying that he had been In some trouble down in Wyoming Little was thought of the matter unti picking up a newspaper, noticed the description of the murderer of Sheriff Ricker, and it tailied exactly with that of Gad, and it was decided to take Gad a prisoner. They sent to Billings two days ago for handcuffs, which reached

About I o'clock this afternoon, while the three men were in the house talk-ing and at a time when Gad had unkled and laid off his two revolvers, stepped between him and the s, and a terrible fight then occurred. The two men finally overpowered him sufficiently for one to place the handouffs on his wrist.

Gad begged them piteously to let him

go, to give him a chance to run, and they might shoot him down like a dog, only he didn't want to be taken back to Casper. He told them that he was Woodard, the man wanted for the murder of Sheriff Ricker.

A reward of \$1,000 was offered for the capture of Woodard, and the sher-ins in northern Wyoming and southern Montana have been after it. Woodard showed Owens and Berkheimer a small hack saw about six inches long, with which he had sawed his way from the Casper fall and this was found sewn a pleat in his shirt when he was searched at the jall this

Washington, Jan. 27.-The ways and means committee today temporarily la, i aside the subject of Cuban reciprocity and entered upon the question of reducing the war revenue taxes. During the morning the tea interests were heard on the proposition to take off the tax of ten cents a pound on tea. imposed by the Spanish war revenue act. This afternoon was set apart for the beer interests.

The tea interests were numerously represented. Some of those present op-posed the proposed change and Chair-man Payne divided the time so that both sides might be heard. Albert B. Sloan of New York, president of the National Tea Duty Repeal association, made the opening statement. He summed up the appeal for reduction as

"First, the duty is an excessive hardship upon the four classes of people in-terested—consumer, retailer, wholesale

grocer and tea importer.
"Second, the duty is injuring permanently the quality of tea sold and con-

Third, the poorer classes pay the tax in full and the better classes are grad-ually being deprived of the best tea.
