## SERIOUS RUNAWAY MISHAP.

Two Big Damage Suits Against U. P. Ry.—Elks Election—Juvenile Court Commission.

Ogden, Utah, March 30.—After a long discussion on the proposition last night, the Weber club, by a substantial majority of its members, went on record as opposing the granting of any franchise for an electric railroad through Ogden for a period of more than 50 years. They made such a recommendation to the city council, and also recommended that the council grant no franchises except it first be satisfied that the party applying for them was financially responsible to construct the road, and that no franchise be granted along Wall avenue.


**RUNAWAY MISHAP.**  
Lee Ritchey and several members of his family were thrown from their wagon in a runaway accident near the Washington school yesterday afternoon, and the father, with one girl about 12 years old, were quite painfully injured. The family reside in Birch creek, and were driving into Ogden on a horse attached to a spring wagon. At about thirty-fourth street the animal became frightened at a street car, dashed into the sidewalk and ran down to Thirty-third street, where it was tipped over and all the occupants were thrown out. Mr. Ritchey did not regain consciousness, while his 12-year-old daughter was quite painfully injured. The other occupants escaped with slight bruises.

**DAMAGE SUITS AGAINST U. P.**  
Two suits were filed yesterday against the Union Pacific Railroad company for damages, each in the sum of \$25,000. A. R. Stone, whose is the administrator of the estate of the late William Murray, and again as the administrator of the estate of J. H. Winslow, Murray was engineer of passenger train No. 3, and Winslow was express messenger. Both were killed in the collision at Wyo., Nov. 12, 1904. The complaints state that the accident was due to the incompetency of the telegraph operator, Miller, who gave the wrong orders to the train crew.

### COUNTY SCHOOL LAW.

Salt Lake County to be Divided into Two Districts—Death of a Veteran.

Sandy, Salt Lake Co., March 28.—The general services over the remains of Mrs. Emily Louise Van Tassel-Naylor, was held in the Sandy ward meeting-house at 2 p. m., a large number of friends and relatives were present. The speakers were Bishop W. D. Kuhns, W. W. Wilson, and E. Holmby, all testifying of the noble life of the deceased. Mrs. Naylor died March 26, 1905 of old age and general debility, at the age of 85 years, 6 months and 21 days. She had a posterity of seven children, 31 grandchildren and 46 great-grandchildren. She was a faithful Latter-day Saint, having joined the Church 43 years ago.

The county school bill which lately became a law will soon be in force in this county. Under this law the county will be divided into two districts, all

that portion of the county lying outside of Salt Lake City, and to the south line of Murray precinct, Salt Lake Granite school district, and that portion of the county lying south of Murray will be called Jordan school district. Each district will have a board of trustees with powers equal to cities of the second class. These districts will appoint each a district superintendent and clerk. The present county superintendent, however, will hold office until June 1, 1907. After that time the office will be declared vacant, and the district superintendents appointed by the district boards will be in charge.

The county commissioners will appoint the first boards of education to serve until the first Wednesday in December, 1905, at that time they will be elected for three years, after the expiration of three years. Each justice's precinct will elect one member of the board of education, there being five justices' precincts in each school district.

The following named persons have been mentioned for members of the board for Granite school district: Amos Garbott, C. M. Sorverson, S. J. Stokely, A. W. Carlson, C. S. Marks, J. C. Cahoon, Richard Howe, J. C. Mackey, J. S. Lindsey, W. J. Horne, For Jordan district: N. Thompson, A. G. Robertson, C. C. Crapo, W. D. Kuhns, Heber A. Smith, D. O. Rideout, J. R. Rawlings, John Hansen, B. H. Beckstead, C. H. Roberts, J. W. Grant, J. A. Leverill.

The law provides a salary of not more than \$300 a year and \$50 traveling expenses. High schools will have to be established in the county this year. The University having decided to drop the high school work it is thought that the Ninth and Tenth grades could be taught successfully in the Farmers ward, Murray, Bingham Canyon, East Jordan and Riverfront, after that both districts can join together and build an advanced high school with domestic sciences and manual training with all the latest equipments.
