CACHE STAKE CONFERENCE.

The Cache Valley quarterly Con-  
ference was held at Logan, May 5th  
and 6th, 1883.

Present of the First Presidency,  
President John Taylor and George  
Q. Cannon; of the Quorum of the  
Twelve, President Wilford Wood-  
ruff, Lorenzo Snow, Franklin D.  
Richards, Albert Carrington and  
Moses Thatcher. Elder Angus M.  
Cannon, President of Salt Lake  
Stake; L. John Nuttall, President of  
Kanab Stake; Lewis W. Shurtliff,  
C. F. Middleton and N. C. Flygare,  
Presidents of Weber Stake; John  
W. Hess, of the Presidency of the  
Davis Stake; Bishop George Hall-  
day of Sautaguin, Lorenzo H. Hatch  
of the Presidency of the Arizona  
Stake; the Presidency of this Stake  
of Zion; Elder Samuel Smith, of  
Brigham City; Elder John Irvine  
and Elder Samuel Roskelley, Presi-  
dent of the High Priests' Quorum.  
Quite a number of the Bishops gave  
encouraging and cheering reports of  
their wards, evincing an increase  
of good works among the Saints.  
Satisfactory statistical, Temple,  
Relief Society, Y. M. and L. M. I.  
A. Primary Associations and Sun-  
day School reports were presented.  
The General and Local Authorities  
of the Church were unanimously  
sustained by the Conference. A  
number of Home Missionaries were  
sustained to labor in the Stake dur-  
ing the season.

The speakers were Elders Albert  
Carrington, Lorenzo Snow, Wm.  
B. Preston, Angus M. Cannon, C.  
O. Card, M. W. Merrill, Wilford  
Woodruff, F. D. Richards, George  
Q. Cannon, President John Taylor,  
and Elder Moses Thatcher.  
The subjects treated upon were of  
paramount importance to the Saints,  
each speaker presenting the various  
topics of his remarks in a pointed  
and spirited manner, and accompan-  
ied by the influence of the Spirit of  
God.

Much good instruction was im-  
parted to the Saints, which, if re-  
duced to practice, will redound  
greatly to the benefit of all. An ex-  
cellent attendance and spirit pre-  
valled during the Conference, which  
was more than usually well attend-
