LEHI.

Additions and Improvements in Sugar Factory and Co-op.

Lehi, Utah Co., May 19.—In addition to the enlargement and many improvements that are now being made in the Utah sugar factory, it is the intention of the company to install two small plants in the main building for the manufacturing of cubes and powdered sugars, which will have a capacity of turning out about one thousand and pounds of sugars per hour. To operate these plants in connection with the main factory will only require about four extra men as the dry granulated sugar will be carried from the granulator or elevator to these plants in just such quantities as are needed for the making of cubes and powdered.

The Utah Sugar Co. has about 45 acres of mother beets planted and they are all looking at this date beautiful and green and like the best crop generally it promises a greater yield per acre than ever before.

THE CO-OP'S IMPROVEMENTS

The People's Co-op. institution now has put up along the old road the brick building prior to history to be erecting of a new two-story brick building.

This old building is a kind of a landmark to the traveler the county road for a great many years, as it was one of the first business places erected by the early settlers of Lehi.

The Utah County Light & Power company are progressing very nicely with their work and the new issue of stock is about all being taken by the original stock holders. W. E. Racker, president of the company, stated today that a plant would be ready to furnish light not later than Sept. 1st next.

Applications for lights are far greater than were the expectations of the stockholders at the time the company was incorporated, and those holding stock are very reluctant in parting with it.

The Utah Sugar company will receive its light for the coming campaign free of charge.
