A MORMON IN CAMP NEAR PETERS-BURGH.

An interesting letter from a soldier, now before Petersburgh, written to a friend in this elty, has been placed in our hands with liberty to use, on the condition that we do not mention names. Considering the news therein contained reliable, we print the following extracts.

IN CAMP NEAR PETERSBURGH, Va. 5 July 4th, 1864. ?

On this ever memorable day in American annals I sit down to pen you a something or other in the form of letter, that is if I shall be allowed as long a time before we pack up to PAID IN ADVANCE. move again, I must inform you I think, before I go any further, that on the 8th of June I joined my company in the Regiment, and have oeen serving under arms since then, and have had the unspeakable satisfaction of firing something like 150 rounds of ammunition in the cause of the Union, and have travelled several times night and day for 3 days trying to flank "Old Lee" but as yet we have not heen successful in that much desired point in "military tactics" I have been once so situated while on the skirmish line with the whole Regiment, that I was compelled to lay flat upon the ground, for about three-fourths of an Mour, while the shells of a Rebel battery, and our own, were passing over our heads so close that they were cutting the brushwood about RAGS also bought at this Office, for which a 3 feet above our heads; 2 shells burst while in our midst, killed 3 and wounded 7 Oace I have been on a charge and marched forward amid a shower of rifle bulle's, Grape, Cannister etc. while men were dropping all around me till I hardly knew whether I was not hit aiso, still I am happpy to inform you that I am here and never enjoyed better health in my life, than I do at the present time. Our Regiment has lost a great number in killed and wounded since the commencement of the campaign. My friend the Major commanding the Regiment was killed in the first battle we were in on the 6th of May, which was the bloodiest battle of the war from early daybreak till far in the afternoon. The sound of musketry was one continuous roar as of thunder. The battle ground was in a place called rewarded. the Wilderness, and the woods wore in such a density that we could only discover the powition of the enemy by their firing. Still they fire took deadly effect upon our columns. To add to the horror of the battle the woods were set on fire and many of our wounded were CH. consumed in the flames who could not be removed in time. I could relate a whole multitade of circumstances which have come under my own observation, enough to sicken you. At present we are laying around Petersburgh with a line of earth-works extending many miles and covering nearly all the lines of communication with the surrounding States thereby cutting off their supplies if this can be ef- thigh with the Church brand, 7 or 8 years old. fectually done we will besiege and then storm Petersburgh which is looked upon as the key years old. Whether we are effectual or not in crushing he rebellion this summer, I feel satisfied that we as an army will be broken up at the end of he campaign, for if the rebels hold out this ampaign, I think England and France will hen interfere and acknowledge the Southern Confederacy, so that I think whichever way t goes there will be a great change in affairs at the end of this campaign.

I was compelled to stop my writing yester- | county. day as orders came to pack up and move. We liftye come about 6 miles to the rear to where !

the general train of supplies is stationed near to "City Point" on the James river. I am at present detailed to make out the muster and pay Rolls of the different companies of the Regiment which will occupy my time for a few days. I am in company with the "Non Commissioned staff," and the Quartermaster's clerks etc. We are camped in the edge of a wood and as the weather is very fine of course we have a pleasant time of it, we have the accommodation of "Wall tents" and consequently can make ourselves comfortable. Yesterday being the ever memorable 4th of course there was a plentiful supply of liquor, (called whiskey out here.) There was a few fights amongst the teamsters, I suppose this last part was got up to make it look natural.

- There is another fearful famine at the unfertunate Cape de Verde groupe of islands. Seven thousand persons are said to have starved to death at Santiago, one of the groupe, between January 1 and May 1, owing to the failure of the crops. Forty or fifty are daily dying at Porto Praya.
