general instructions in regard to making reports required by the school law. He encouraged the establishment of school libraries, and the grading of the schools. The advantages of parents' meetings in securing the co-operation of parents in the work of the schools were also referred to, and the trustees advised to secure the aid of the parents by first awakening their interest.

The trustees were reminded that there is a compulsory law on the statute books, and were encouraged to have it enforced wherever necessary.

Mr. Brown referred to the effort made by some educators for legislative enactment providing for a county board of education to take the place of district trustees. He was not in favor of this, believing that generally better and more satisfactory results could be obtained by the present method, providing the trustees were energetic in the performance of their duties, and impressed upon them the necessity for effective work done by the trustee would be the best method of counteracting the county board proposal.

Other questions relating to school work were discussed, and the meeting exhibited a gratifying interest in matters pertaining to the educational interests of the county.

At the meeting of the county commissioners the application of H. F. Thomas for a license as abstractor was reconsidered, and taken under advisement for one week.

The following road supervisors, for the precincts named, were appointed: James Taylor, Lehi; Frank G. Rouse, Goshen; George F. Gilbreth, Mount Nebo.

Charles Miller was appointed constable for Mount Nebo precinct.

A number of official bonds were approved, and claims allowed.

Old Folks Day—Memorial Services in Honor of Dr. Maeser.
