## NEWS OF THE WEST.

Lockjaw Caused by a Splinter in the Foot.

EXTENDED SKIN DISEASE CLEARS OUT.

Unsettled & Mortified—Torture Wanted in Litigation—Death in a Castle of Errors.

Charles Gwynne, a telegrapher, was attacked by a gang of robbers at Belmont, Ariz., last week and had one arm and a leg cut off.

The telegraphic lines of Arizona, an extension of the Congress, has been sold for about \$200,000 to give the new owners full mining company power.

The Northern Pacific has given its stations to the Southern Pacific, which has agreed to pay \$100,000 to give the new owners increased facilities.

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An English company has been formed in the City of Mexico to finance construction of the English Mexican railway, which is to extend from the city to the coast.

Frank Frazee, New Eastland, Cal., has sold his ranch, 1,000 acres, to a man in Oregon. Washington Mountain and sheep ranch and will leave for his field in August next.

Twelve years ago W. H. Wallace, one of the founders of the Central Pacific railway, and leaving his wife a house at San Fran., she got into difficulties, and after a week's illness died. Within a week the whole fortune had been used to ransom her.

At a Chinese funeral in Visalia, Calif., recently three Chinese stood at the gate and handed 10-cent pieces, wrapped in paper, to everyone who passed out of the cemetery. Small coins containing gold were through the gate several times.

The seven-year-old son of Dr. J. W. Loveland, of Ogallala, Neb., was born with a terrible death mark, the little fellow, while at play, climbed and fell backward into a barrel of boiling grease, which had just been removed from the fire. Into the barrel the child was severely scalded and died a few hours after birth.

The Badlands, Wyoming, Bulletin says: The skull and a part of the skeleton of a man have been discovered in a crevise in the rocks near the mouth of the Little Horn, near Laramie River.
