PRISON LABOR.

The following by Heiss was referred to the committee on prisons:

Resolved, That prison labor can be used to the best advantage to the city's interest by making the necessary arrangements with some railroad company, that has sufficient land alongside its line so that a stockade could be built, where rock could be hauled in by the railroad company and be harled in by the railroad company and broken up by prisoners to be used in macadamizing streets. Such arrangements could undoubtedly be made with the Denver and Rio Grande Western company, who have large blocks of vacant lands on their lands in the southwestern part of the city.
