

PRISON LABOR.

The following by Heiss was referred to the committee on prisons:

Resolved, That prison labor can be used to the best advantage to the city's interest by making the necessary arrangements with some railroad company, that has sufficient land alongside its line so that a stockade could be built, where rock could be hauled in by the railroad company and broken up by prisoners to be used in macadamizing streets. Such arrangements could undoubtedly be made with the Denver and Rio Grande Western company, who have large blocks of vacant lands on their lands in the southwestern part of the city.

WHAT IS RED TAPE?

Councilman Wantland offered the following resolution which was referred to the committee on municipal laws:

Resolved, That the committee on municipal laws, with the city attorney associated, be requested to consider the present sidewalk ordinance and report a new ordinance, eliminating as far as possible, the red tape, with which the present ordinance seems to be burdened.

Councilman Rich asked what was meant by the words "red tape." The question was unanswered and reference made to the committee above named.

PLATS AND MAPS.

The Salt Lake Abstract Title, Guarantee and Trust Company submitted a bid to furnish maps and abstracts of the city for \$500; or with a complete set of plats for \$800.

The Security Abstract Company submitted bids for the same work at \$490 and \$750, respectively. Referred.

ANOTHER SPRINKLING DISTRICT.

V. M. C. Silva and others asked that a new sprinkling district be created covering the territory bounded as follows: On the west by the west side of Tenth East street from north side of Brigham street to south side of Second South street, east on north side of Brigham street to east side of Thirteenth East street, south on Thirteenth East street (east side) to Fifth South street, west on Second South street (south side) to Tenth East; also, First street from First East street to S street. Referred to special committee.

ROAD TO MORGAN,

Wantland offered the following:

Resolved, That a special committee of three be appointed by the Mayor to report upon the advantages and estimated cost of completing the wagon road via City Creek and Hardscrabble canyons, to the town of Morgan.

Adopted.

THE "LIBERAL" COLONIZERS.

Evans moved that the vote by which the old silk factory had been ordered removed, be reconsidered as there were two families living in it. They rented the building from the city.

The Mayor—We cannot tear the structure down over the heads of our own tenants.

Rich—I am very sorry that my friend Evans has brought this matter up as there is an ugly stamp upon it. It need not be stated for what purpose the building was rented, that is generally known. Reference to the fact that it was a rendezvous for hobos who went there early in January, to remain until a given time and perform a certain work is quite sufficient. If the matter is pushed further I shall demand a full

investigation and ask that be explained in open Council. I am informed that the present tenants rent the property from the Chief of the Fire Department.

The matter was disposed on a motion of Wantland to refer it to the committee on streets and public grounds.

RETURNED ELDERS.

Elder D. J. Lau, of Soda Springs, has just returned home at the close of his labors in the Swiss and German mission, for which he started on November 6th, 1889. He has thus been absent two years and four months. Upwards of two years of this time he spent in Germany, and there made the acquaintance of a great many persons, who evinced much interest in the principles of the Gospel. He also baptized quite a number, some of whom are now in Utah. He received his release on January 25th last, and left Germany on February 9th. One sister and two children accompanied him from Germany.

Elder C. F. Emery, of this city, returned from his mission to the Southern States on Saturday, March 5. He has been absent since March 12, 1890, and has labored in the South Carolina conference all the time. The conference is in a very good condition, having improved remarkably during the last year. Several new fields of labor have been opened up and the people as a whole manifest a greater desire to listen to the Gospel than has formerly been the case. There are now twelve missionaries laboring in the conference.

Elder R. H. Hodge, also of Salt Lake, left the city on March 12, 1890, and has been laboring in Alabama and Mississippi, and gives an encouraging report of the work in this field. Quite a number are embracing the Gospel and a good spirit is manifested towards the Elders. Trials and mobbings occur occasionally, but even such experiences are resulting in good. He returns in good health and spirits.

Elder William H. Pettegrew, of Nephi, returned on March 5 from a mission to the Southern States, where he has been laboring in the Mississippi Conference. He left for his field of labor on March 12, 1890, and has met with fair success in his work. Brother Pettegrew reports the conference in a good condition. There are signs of a growing disposition on the part of the general public to listen to the testimony of the Elders and prospects are promising.

Elder Samuel A. Cornwall, of Mill Creek, who left this city for a mission to the West Virginia conference, March 12, 1890, returned home on Saturday last and called at our office today. He reports that he labored in twenty-one counties of West Vir-

ginia, Virginia and Kentucky. He had many excellent friends. The hospitality of the people in that region is almost without bounds. The conference is in an excellent condition. Elder Cornwall's health was better while on his mission than for many years previous. On the 24th of November last he succeeded Elder L. S. Pond, of Lewiston, Cache County, as President of the West Virginia Conference. He filled the office until released to return home.

Elder Samuel Worsencroft, of Payson, who has been on a mission to Great Britain arrived in Salt Lake City today. He left on April 30, 1890. He labored for six months in the Manchester conference and then presided over the Liverpool conference, until released to return home. Elder Worsencroft says the prospects are encouraging in the field where he has been laboring, although some opposition is to be met with. He has succeeded in making many friends, and returns in good health. He has enjoyed his work abroad and been kindly treated by the people.
