REMAINS FOUND IN WATER DITCH

Lifeless Body of Mrs. Kristina Larsen Recovered—Missing Since Tuesday.

Ogden, Sept. 17.—The lifeless body of Mrs. Kristina Larsen was found about 10 o'clock yesterday morning lying face downward in the Harrisville canal, which contained only about 18 inches of water. Peter Van Zeeven discovered the body and gave the alarm.

Tuesday morning last Mrs. Larsen disappeared shortly before noon and no trace of her could be found until her body was located yesterday within a body of water. Just how Mrs. Larsen came into the ditch is unknown, but the suspicion is she fell from a small dam in the canal in the foot bridge, from which an attack of heart failure, from which she had suffered for a considerable time, had been taking her to get out of bed and was drowned.

SATTERFIELD NON-SUITED.

The jury who heard the damage suit brought by A. Y. Satterfield against the Ogden and Northwestern, brought in a verdict Saturday evening of no cause of action. Satterfield was kicked from a moving car on the motor line by the motorman, and received slight injuries. He then hurled a rock through the car window, was arrested and fined \$10 for that, and after that he filed suit against the company for \$10,000, but the jury could not see any just cause for damages, and therefore brought in the verdict mentioned.

BARBER LAW UNCONSTITUTIONAL.

Judge Murphy has rendered his decision in the case brought by the state board of barber examiners against several of the local barbers to compel them to pay the renewal fee of \$1 per annum on their state license. The court held that as the law required only the barbers in the larger cities of the state to pay the fee and those in the smaller towns escaped the tax, the court held that it was discriminating, and therefore unconstitutional, and the law of the state is illegal which does not require all within the bounds of the state to comply with it. He therefore dismissed the case, and unless the suit is appealed and the decision reversed the barbers will not be required to pay the annual fee for renewal of their license.
